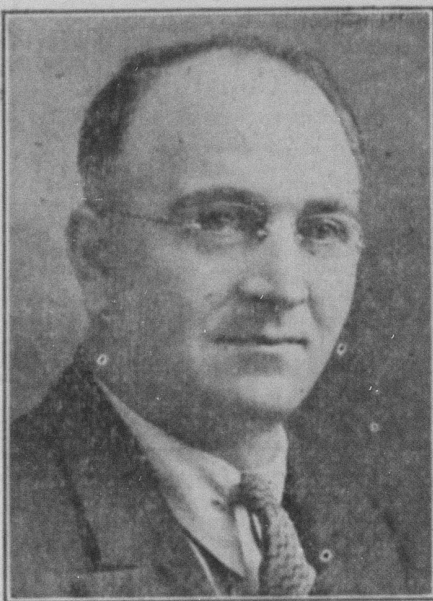

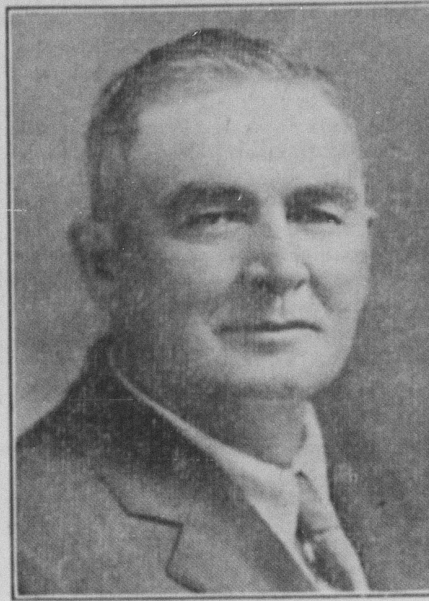

Backed by four years of efficient and courteous public service, Boyd Cleveland Vonada, of Bellefonte, Democratic nominee for the office of Prothonotary of Centre county, presents a complete sketch of his life for the careful consideration of both Democratic and Republican voters at the November election.

Receiving his advanced education in the school of experience, Mr. Vonada brings before the voters of the county a man who has a practical knowledge of farming, railroading, school teaching, the chief clerkship of one of the county's most important offices, and many years' experience as a skilled mechanic.

He was born in Gregg township on December 14, 1893, the son of the late David J. Vonada, former well known Gregg township farmer, and Emma Rote Vonada, who now resides a short distance from Penna Cave. During his boyhood Mr. Vonada attended the Gregg township schools and during the summer vacations helped his father on the farm. Both of his parents came from staunch and substantial Democratic stock.

Completing his preliminary education he became a student at the Spring Mills high school but at the age of 18 years left school to become a teacher in the grade schools. He taught two terms in the schools of Gregg township, and three terms in the Haines township schools. While still engaged in that profession he was united in marriage on June 2, 1914, at Lock Haven, with Miss Ruth Crouse, daughter of J. Hol Crouse, well known Aaronsburg business man.

Three years after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Vonada came to Bellefonte where Mr. Vonada was employed for two years by the Potter-Hoy Hardware company. When the United States became involved in the World War he left the hardware business and entered the employ of the Pennsylvania Railroad as a fireman out of Sunbury, on the Williamsport Division. Until the advent of the post-war slump, he was engaged as fireman on trains running from Sunbury to Harrisburg, Renovo and Bellefonte.

When a general reduction in employees was made by the railroad Mr. Vonada returned to Bellefonte and became chief mechanic at the Willis Wilson garage a position he creditably held for seventeen years. He left four years ago upon receiving the appointment as chief clerk to the Centre County Commissioners. Since that time his record is well known to the public, for he has proved himself not only a most efficient clerk, but has established many innovations in placing the voluminous records of the county on a business-like basis.

Mr. Vonada is an active and faithful member of the Bellefonte Evangelical church; taught a young women's class in the Sunday school for six years, and at present time is secretary of the Sunday school. He is a member of the Bellefonte Lodge I. O. O. F. and of the Encampment. His principal hobbies are hunting and fishing.

Mr. and Mrs. Vonada have two children: Harry, who is just out of high school and Miss Mona, a freshman in high school.

Conscientious, able and promising the public the same high type of service in the future that he has rendered in the past, if elected, Mr. Vonada respectfully solicits every voter's support at the polls.

The office of County Treasurer requires a man of good, sound business judgment; one who can exercise no little amount of executive ability, and above all, one who has the best interests of the county at heart.

Exactly fitted into this pattern is Charles Henry Lee, of Walker township, the Democratic nominee for that important office. Mr. Lee has never been a lover of the spectacular, especially in men prominent in public office, but he has always been a thrifty, hard-working farmer, who is held in the highest esteem by his fellow-townsmen. Honest to the core, dependable in every emergency, Mr. Lee submits a brief outline of his life for the consideration of the voters in November.

Charles Henry Lee was born in Jacksonsville, Marion township, February 16, 1876. His father, Jeremiah Lee, was a well known Marion township farmer, and his mother, Emma Yearick Lee, also traced her descendants back through generations of prosperous and thrifty Centre county farm folks. Both of Mr. Lee's parents are now deceased, but the lessons in thrift, business acumen, and the high principles of the Golden Rule which they passed on to their son, are among his most precious heritages.

When Mr. Lee was only nine years old the family moved from Jacksonsville to Walker township, where he has resided ever since. He attended the Walker township public schools, completed his education at the age of 20 years, and then went to work for his father on the farm, continuing there until his marriage in September 1897 with Sarah Fulton, of below Hecla. The following spring he and his wife went to housekeeping on the old Overdorf farm, and in the 37 years that have passed since that time they have lived happily at the same farm. During the course of the years, Mr. Lee accumulated sufficient funds to purchase the farm, which is now his own.

He served as Overseer of the Poor of Walker township for two terms, is an active and faithful member of the Reformed church at Hublersburg, and a senior elder of that congregation, having been elder delegate to several meetings of the Eastern Synod.

The Lees have three living children—Mrs. Laroe Porter, of Hublersburg; Nevlin Lee, who resides on the farm adjoining his father's place, and Melvin Lee, at home. Another daughter, Miriam, was fatally injured about 15 years ago in an automobile accident in Bellefonte. She was 22 years old at the time of her death.

The only other close relative, of Mr. Lee is a brother, Clyde Lee, who resides on a farm between Hublersburg and Hecla.

Mr. Lee is an ardent hunter and finds time each fall to spend several days in the woods.

In the belief that Centre Countians want a man who has mature judgment; who has been a success in his own line of endeavor, and who promises an economical and efficient administration if elected, Charles Lee respectfully solicits the consideration of all voters at the polls in November.
