COLLEGE BARN DESTROYED; LOSS \$12,000 TO \$15,000. One of the large Pennsylvania State College farm barns, located on one of the eastern tracts where the apple orchards are located, was totally destroyed by fire on Thursday night.

The loss is estimated at between \$12,000 and \$15,000, covered by insurance. The fire was discovered at about 6:30 and appears to have been in a hay mow, but its origin is not known.

In addition to the large amount of hay and grain in the barn, there were also implements, including a tractor valued at \$2,000.

Close by to the site of the barn is located a cold storage plant with a capacity of 30,000 bushels, and a packing shed. With the use of a chemical engine and a pump that utilized water from a cistern, both these structures were saved from destruction.
