## Republicans Capture All County Offices Except That of Register

### BOWERSOX IS NAMED AS MINORITY COMMISSIONER.

Up to the time this issue of the Reporter went to press (3:30 Wednesday), no totals on Tuesday's election in Centre county were obtainable. It is conceded, however, that the Republicans made a clean sweep, except for the office of Register, the returns showing John L. Wetzler was re-elected. D. A. Mcowell, for Recorder may slip through safely, but at this time the figures are challenged. Alfred Bowersox is the minority county commissioner.

Keeler's majority over Pearce for Sheriff may run as high as 2000. Other Republican majorities, however, are by no means so impressive.

The vote throughout the county was very heavy, and in spots there was much activity shown on election day. Many voters omitted recording their expression on local option. On the south side of the county the wets carried in all districts except Centre Hall borough.

### COMMISSIONERS OFFER \$1000 REWARD FOR SLAYERS OF COLL AND MUIRHEAD

The Centre County commissioners offer a reward of \$500 each for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the slayer or slayers of Hugh Muirhead, a Coleville man, and Guy Coll, a Bellefonte barber.

Coll died in the Centre County hospital May 22, 1934, from injuries received in a mysterious manner, while Muirhead was found murdered September 30.

Tuesday of last week an order was issued by Judge Fleming permitting the body of Muirhead to be exhumed for a more complete autopsy, but no additional evidence of value was found.

Total number voting, 335—Democrats, 216; Republican, 119. The Democratic vote cast represented 80 per cent, and the Republican, 76%.

The Centre Hall high school soccer team will begin the defense of its county championship this Friday when it will meet Gregg Township Vocational, Eastern Division champions, on the local high school field, at 3:00 p. m.

Gregg Township will enter the series slight favorites, due to their undefeated record. Centre Hall lost two games to date while winning eight.

The probable line-up for the local team will be, Capt. Frank, center forward; Bradford and Walker, inside; Johnson and McClenahan, outside; Coldron, Wetzel and Dutrow, halfbacks; Reish and Heckman, fullbacks; and Gerhart, goalie.

The second and third games of the series will not be decided upon at the present time.

The championship for the Western Division of the county soccer league was safely retained for the second successive season by the local high school squad when they defeated Hubbersburg, 2-0, last Friday, on the opponents' home field. The game was hotly contested and forced the "Tigers" to play at top speed throughout the entire game.

### PROGRESSIVE FARMERS BUY HEIFERD STEERS FOR FEEDING

A carload of Herford steers, shipped from Pittsburgh, were unloaded at the Centre Hall railroad station last week. The shipment contained thirty-eight animals, half of them weighing about 500 pounds and the others a hundred pounds more. The Herfords, you will recall, are white faced, and are an ideal type of beef cattle. When separated as to weight, each lot had a most uniform appearance in color, shape and size.
