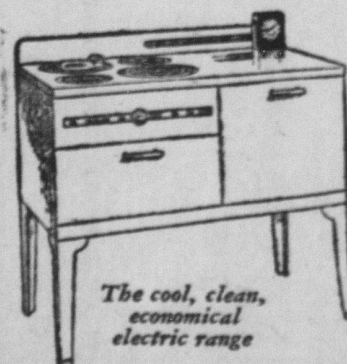

FARM INCOME SOARS IN PENNSYLVANIA

During the first eight months this year, Pennsylvania farmers experienced a greater relative increase in cash receipts from the sale of products than did the farmers in thirty other states, J. Hansell French, secretary of agriculture, has announced.

These receipts from the sale of principal farm products in Pennsylvania were estimated at \$136,029,000, an increase of \$17,029,000 over the corresponding period of 1934, and \$34,592,000 more than in the same period of 1932, according to a compilation of the United States bureau of agricultural economics, Mr. French said. The percentage gain was 14.5 in Pennsylvania, 38.0 in Indiana—the State making the best showing—and 9.2 for the entire country.

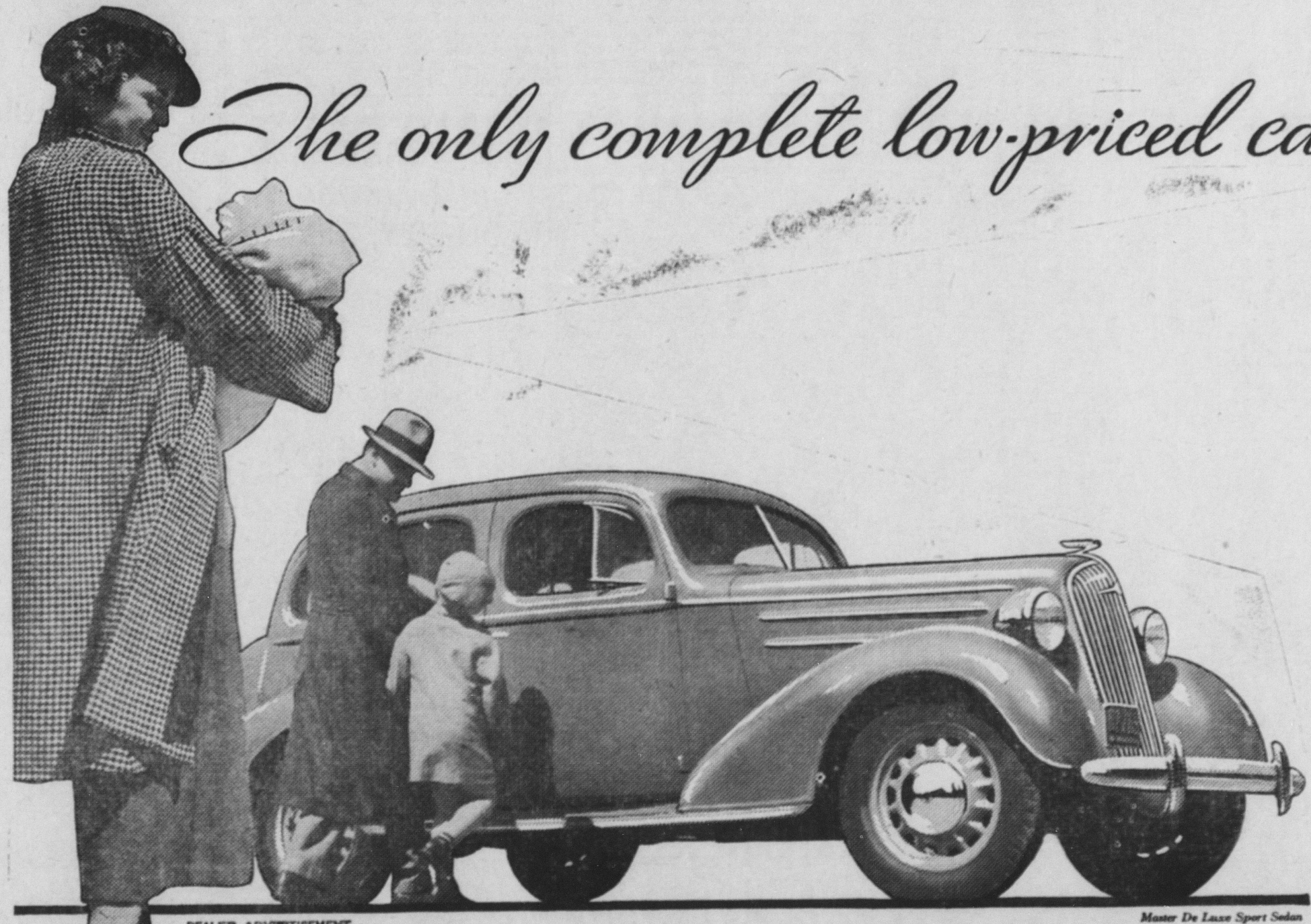

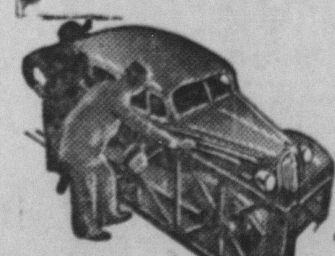
