NATIONAL GRANGE OPENED AT SACRAMENTO, CALIF.

Yesterday (Wednesday) the National Grange opened its 69th annual session at Sacramento, California, with 35 voting states represented. In what is likely to be the greatest gathering of farm people ever held West of the Mississippi River: a nine-day session given over to earnest consideration of the needs of agriculture and the problems of rural life.

Below are quoted a few paragraphs from the address of National Grange Master Lewis J. Tabor:

We have some who would confiscate all wealth and redistribute it. We have others who would take all income over a certain sum and divide it amongst all citizens. We have others with florid schemes of taxation and distribution. The trouble with each group is that their arithmetic is faulty. For example, if we had confiscated all income over \$100,000 per individual in 1934, and then divided it amongst the 124,000,000 people, the result is so pitifully small that instead of sharing wealth, it would be sharing pennies.

The Grange believes that there is a solution to this question, and that there can be a broader distribution of wealth, in our nation in accordance with our Constitution and our ideals. The solution of this problem requires five initial steps:

- (1) Restore and maintain prices for the farmer;
- (2) Shorter hours and fair wages

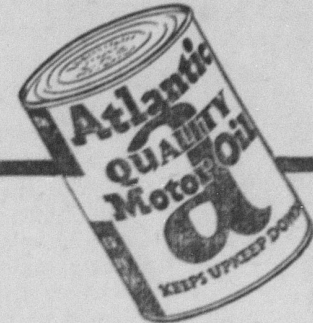
Mrs. John B. Wert, Tusseyville, now a patient in the Centre County hospital, is reported improving after a major operation within the past ten days.
