Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Heffner, of Pittsburgh, visited Saturday at the David Fortney home.

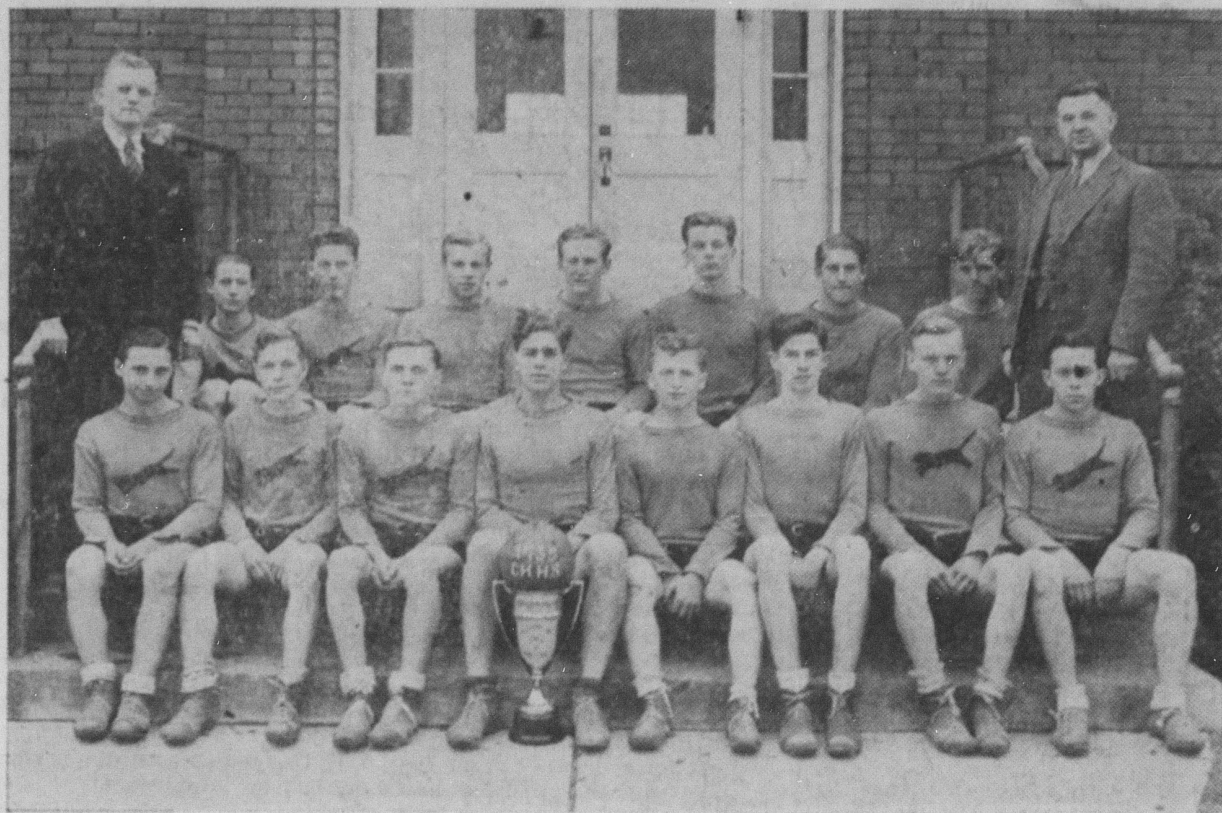

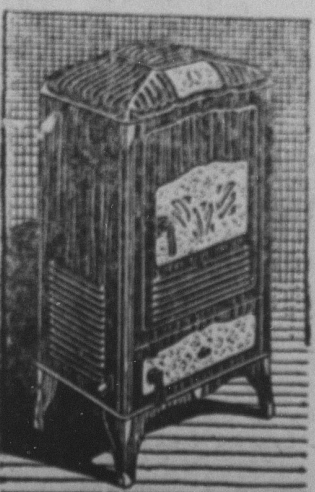
