A putty nose and a tall yard long are among the attractions possessed by a monkey newly placed in the famous London zoo. It comes from the African Gold coast. These monkeys have weak circulations in their tails, for the blood has to be pumped so far by the heart. A touch of cold weather, and the tail wilts like a dahlia in a frost. After stormy blasts in the bay of Biscay the average length of the decoration when the creature reaches this country is from six inches to a foot. Even if the tail is still all there, it has been blighted and fades away in the zoo. Many putty-nosed monkeys eat their cold-stored tails. They are quite given to this habit until the zoo uses a certain red ointment, which spoils the flavor.

The new putty-nose was brought to England in wonderful condition by the donor, a Mr. Woodward, who is a laboratory expert at the Medical Research Institute at Sekeid, where the yellow fever scourge is tackled.—London Times.

Indian Decoration Day

An annual Decoration day, in both name and deed, is observed by Lower Yukon river Indians. Fifteen families of Indians from Nulato and other villages met at Koyukuk, Alaska, to fulfill a queer custom, that of erecting houses over the graves of those who died the past year.

The shelters of the old graves were given a fresh coat of highly colored paint. Many of the unique mauseleums are constructed with skill and care, have windows, floors and rug-like articles such as were used by the departed ones. Food and drink are renewed each year during the potlatch following Decoration day.

Every western Alaskan Indian tribe has some different method of protecting the spirits of departed ones.

Whales Are "Brains"

The largest brain in the world, according to speakers at a congress of natural science, recently held in England, is possessed by the whale.

Prof. W. Weyand argued against a prevalent belief that the largest brain claim is shared by whales, elephants and man. He stated that the whale alone justified the claim, the largest whale ever caught having a brain weighing 7,000 grams.

The human brain, he added, seldom exceeds an average weight of 1,250 to 1,400 grams in the male and 1,140 to 1,340 in the female.

M., Eastern Standard Time, for the construction of an addition to School Building, situated in Centre Hall, Centre county, Pa., in accordance with the drawings, specifications and instructions to bidders, as prepared by W. D. Shollenberger, Architect, at which time and place the sealed proposals will be publicly opened and read.

This project is being financed in part with funds provided by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, and all requirements of the Public Works P. W. A. Form No. 179, July 22, 1935, and any amendments thereto, together with all other requirements of the Public Works Administration must be adhered to.

Plans, drawings and specifications and instructions to bidders are available at the office of the Architect at 11 West Fourth Street, Williamsport, Penna. All bidders will be required to deposit a certified check made payable to the Architect, when plans are received. The deposit check for General Construction will be \$15.00. The deposit check required for Heating and Ventilating and Electric Wiring plans and specifications will be \$10.00. The amount of the checks will be returned provided a bid is received and the plans and specifications are returned in good order within one week after bids are received. Should no bid be received, or plans and specifications not returned within one week after bids are taken, the prospective bidder forfeits his check to the Architect.

For the benefit of subcontractors and materialmen, plans and specifications will be on file in the plan room of the F. W. Dodge Corp., 1321 Arch St., Philadelphia, Pa. Separate sealed proposals to be submitted for each of the following branches of the work, to wit: (1) General Construction, (2) Heating and Ventilating, (3) Electrical Work. Each bidder shall submit with his sealed proposal a bid bond or certified check for not less than 5% of the bid.

A Performance Bond of 100 per centum of the contract price and a separate Labor and Materialmen's Bond in accordance with the statutory provisions, but in no case less than 50 per centum of the contract price, are required.

The award of the contract shall be conditioned upon funds being made available for such construction by the Owner. No bidder may withdraw his bid for a period of sixty days after the date set for the opening thereof.

F. D. R. BIRTHDAY BALL ANNOUNCED FOR 1936

Plans were announced this week for another nation-wide "birthday ball for the President" proceeds to go into the battle against infantile paralysis.

Henry L. Doherty, chairman of the national committee making the arrangements, wrote Roosevelt to ask that he "loan to this great humanitarian cause your 54th birthday anniversary next January 30."

Roosevelt, before agreeing to the plan, communicated with the Georgia Warm Springs Foundation, in which he is interested. Answering the President, Basil O'Connor, treasurer of the Foundation, recommended that the funds from the dances be divided:

Seventy per cent. to be retained locally for after-treatment, the money to be disbursed through local orthopedic hospitals, services of doctors upon which the community depends under ordinary or epidemic conditions.

Thirty per cent. to be turned over to Roosevelt for presentation to the Foundation, to be used "for the continuance and extension of its part in the nation-wide fight against infantile paralysis."

H. L. Ehrhart, Cashier First Nat. Bk., has been recommended to National Ch. Doherty for appointment to act in the capacity of chairman of the local committee. With the same cooperation of citizens of the community the 1936 Birthday Party for the President to be held on Thursday evening January 30, will be equally successful to that of the party staged during the beginning of the present year.
