DR. W. C. DUNLAP REACHES AGE OF 70 ON SUNDAY From the Tyrone Times is here reprinted a brief reference to an informal celebration of the 70th birthday anniversary of Dr. W. C. Dunlap, Tyrone, known to many of our readers, as is also Mrs. Dunlap, the former Miss May Rhone. The Times says:

The Times extends its sincere felicitations to Rev. and Mrs. Wilton Clyde Dunlap, who on Sunday, December 29, reached the age of "Three Score and Ten." Dr. Dunlap has been active in the Lutheran ministry for forty years. He is a graduate of Gettysburg College and Theological Seminary and since his commencement days has been preaching the gospel of Christ, filling many important charges in Pennsylvania, Indiana and Kentucky. He is retired from the active ministry now, although he has been acting as supply pastor at the Gallitzin Lutheran church the past two years.

Dr. Dunlap was the recipient of a number of very beautiful and useful gifts on his seventieth birthday.

PEACOCK FARM HOUSE AT PENN HALL PARTLY BURNED The Peacock farm house, tenanted by Roland Zettle, located east of Penn Hall along State Highway Route 45, was partially destroyed by fire at noon on Friday. The fire was evidently due to a defective fuse, as the fire was first observed on the attic. The roof and second floor were much damaged by flames and the remainder of the building was water-soaked, resulting in damage to the plastering.

The Millheim fire company was called, and with their splendid equipment poured hundreds of gallons of water on the flames from a nearby stream, soon overcoming the march of the destructive element.

The Centre Hall pumper stood by, but was not put into action since the flames were under control before their arrival, their lateness not being in any way due to lack of quick action in starting or travel.

The property burned was originally the Neese home, later acquired by the late Peter Smith, and inherited successively by the late Dr. C. P. Smith and his daughter, Mrs. Robert Peacock, Cleveland, Ohio. The house was substantially built of plank, and in good repair.

BRAUCHT—Wm. Edward Braucht, one of Coburn's most prominent residents, died at his home in that community, Wednesday of last week, following an illness of several weeks. Death was due to a complication of disease at the age of 72.

Mr. Braucht was born in Penn township, May 16, 1863. He was educated in the school there and also graduated from what was once called New Berlin Academy, at New Berlin. Following his graduation from the academy, he followed the teaching profession for the remainder of his life, serving in the capacity in Penn township for a long number of years.

Mr. Braucht was married on June 20, 1886, to Miss Mary Catherine Boehm, who survives his death together with four children, Mrs. Franklin Stover, Millheim; Thurman and Rufus J. Braucht of Woodward; and Orpha at home. One brother, N. F. Braucht, of Allenwood, also survives while two other brothers, Maurice, of Avis, and Dr. Harry S. Braucht, of Spring Mills, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning from the Coburn Lutheran church; interment at Aaronsburg.

HOSTERMAN—Hazel M. Hosterman, wife of John Hosterman, Spring Mills, R. D., died in the Centre County hospital after having been a patient there for a few days, from complications. She was aged 39 years, 11 months and was a daughter of John M. and Emma Wolf Stonebraker.

She is survived by her husband and five daughters: Mrs. Ray Ard, of Millheim; Mrs. Morris Boob, Woodward; Genevieve, Velma and Amber, at home. Two brothers, and two sisters also survive: Charles Stonebraker, of Lebanon; Mrs. Martin Bressler, of Lewistown, and Mrs. Gail Smith, of Lebanon.

Funeral services were held from the home and burial made at Millheim, Rev. A. C. Paulhanus officiating.

SMITH—Mrs. Alice S. Smith, of Akron, Ohio, died on December 21st. Her sister, Mrs. Mary E. Neff, of Centre Hall, was present at the time of her death. Mrs. Neff and her brother, John F. Ziegler, of Altoona, and her niece and husband, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Krause, accompanied the remains to Centre Hall where interment was made on last Friday. Burial services were in charge of Rev. D. R. Keener, Spring Mills, in Akron were in charge of Rev. Dr. George Lonacker, pastor of the Wooster Ave. Reformed church. Her husband, James F. Smith, died about six years ago. She was the eldest child of John and Sarah (Heckman) Ziegler and was born at Spring Mills, July 7, 1857. Another brother, William F. Ziegler, of Cape May Court House, N. J., also survives and was present at the burial service.

HERMAN—Mrs. Nancy Herman, 1014 Third Avenue, Altoona, died in a hospital in that city on Saturday afternoon, from complications, having been ill for a year or more.

The body was shipped by rail to Centre Hall on Tuesday and conveyed to the home of a brother, John W. Vonada, in Georges Valley, by F. V. Goodhart, undertaker, from where funeral services were held Wednesday forenoon, and burial made in the cemetery of the Holy Cross Lutheran church, Georges Valley, Rev. L. A. Wagner officiating.

The deceased's maiden name was Nancy Vonada, a daughter of Harvey and Annette (Zettle) Vonada, both deceased, and was born and reared in Georges Valley at the home from where the funeral was held. Her husband, Frank B. Herman, died several years ago, but there survive her two sons—William, of Hordaysburg, and Howard, at home; also a sister, and two brothers, namely: Mrs. Scott Decker, Spring Mills; John W. Vonada and Ammon Vonada, both of Georges Valley. Also (Mrs. Adam Heckman) is deceased. The age of the deceased was 53 years.

BROWN—After a prolonged illness Harriet Brown, wife of Samuel M. Brown, long a resident of Spring Mills, died at her home on Wednesday of last week.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon in the Lutheran church and burial made in Georges Valley, Rev. L. A. Wagner officiating.

The deceased was a daughter of Jacob and Rebecca (Harter) McCool, and was born in Gregg township. There survive her three children: Mrs. May Miller, Detroit, Mich.; Miss Mabel, Sunbury, and Harry, Williamsport, also, several grandchildren. Mrs. F. W. E. Snyder, Millfordsburg, and Mrs. William Finkle, Buffalo, N. Y., are surviving sisters.

Mrs. Brown was aged 76 years, and bore her age remarkably well.

SONES—William Sones died at his home at Spring Mills, Tuesday evening at 7:00 o'clock, from a heart condition from which he suffered for a number of years.

He was reared in Harris township in the vicinity of Boalsburg. His age was 77 years.

Funeral services will be held on Friday afternoon, 2:00 o'clock, and burial made in the Georges Valley cemetery, Rev. L. A. Wagner, pastor of the Lutheran church, to officiate, following which the Spring Mills I. O. O. F., of which the deceased was a member for more than twenty-five years, will conduct the lodge service.

The deceased is survived by a wife and one daughter. The former was Susan Brown, and the daughter, Emma, wife of Aaron Stitzer, of Rochester, N. Y. There also survives a half-sister, living in Tyrone.

BURIAL OF REV. GREENHOE, AT CENTRE HALL, SATURDAY

The body of Rev. Samuel Franklin Greenhoe was interred in the local cemetery on Saturday afternoon, following services at the home in Jersey Shore, where the death occurred. Services at the grave, as also at the home, were conducted by Rev. Fitzgerald, pastor of the Lutheran church, Jersey Shore.

The body, on being brought to Centre Hall, was placed on view in the vestibule of the Lutheran church where the minister closed his ministerial services.

The pallbearers were these associate ministers: Rev. J. F. Harkins, Rev. Louis V. Lesher, Rev. D. R. Keener, Rev. W. K. Hosterman, Rev. Seth Russell, Rev. L. A. Wagner.

Rev. Greenhoe's age was eighty years, seven months and 26 days. His retirement from the ministry dates back to August 1st, 1935, at which time he relinquished the pastorate of the Penns Valley Lutheran church, comprised of appointments at Centre Hall, Tuseyville, Georges Valley, Spring Mills and Farmers Mills, the latter three located in Gregg township and the second in Potter, after a continuous service of fifty-four years. Other charges served were at West Milton, Juniata, Stone Church, Dallastown, Orrstown.

He was born in Snyder county, a son of Jacob and Elizabeth Aurdand Greenhoe. His preliminary education was obtained in the public schools, and later he became a student in Selmsgrove University, now known as Susquehanna University, and on graduating entered the theological seminary connected with the University, both institutions being under the control of the Lutheran church. Upon obtaining his license as a minister he was almost immediately selected as pastor of the West Milton Lutheran church.

The average length of his service on the six charges was approximately nine years, his pastorate at Centre Hall having been one of the longest, almost eleven years, during which time he gave his undivided time to his work. Here like on other fields of labor, Rev. Greenhoe was able to steer clear of embroilments with or among his parishioners—a happy faculty.

Among the associate ministers in the various fields he served, he was frequently honored and his productions
