A New Gym, Yes.—The people of Gregg township are building strongly on the idea that the revised plans for the proposed auditorium and gymnasium have been reduced to dimensions and requirements that will permit construction within the present financial means of the district.

The location is eighty-four feet to the south of the present Vocational school building. On the space between the present and proposed buildings, at some future time, will be erected a connecting structure, the plan for which has also been made in a general way. The dimensions of the proposed combined auditorium and gymnasium are 64 ft. 3 in. by 65 ft. 11 in.

The outer and inner walls will be of red brick, the inner walls, for the present, to be unfinished.
