Gregg Township School Board Considers Bids.—The Gregg Township School Board considered the bids for construction of a combined auditorium and gymnasium at a meeting held in the Vocational building last Wednesday afternoon. Bids for construction of the entire structure were higher than anticipated, and consequently the financing of the project by the district is a matter of major importance at this time.

Hunter & Caldwell, Architects, have advised that the awarding of contracts has been extended from January 15 to February 1st, which means that the Board must dispose of the bids by that time. In the meantime the architects are hoping that some plan may be worked out whereby it would be possible to take advantage of the Federal Funds allowed to be repaid by the local government in case it is used on the project.
