Mrs. H. F. Bradley, who has been seriously ill for many months and underwent hospital treatment for weeks, is again in the Centre County hospital.

Mrs. Carrie Kane, who was severely injured in a fall down a stairway, is not making much headway toward recovery. Mrs. Kane makes her home with Willard Bair, who lives in the Kings homestead near Holy Cross Lutheran church in Georges Valley.

The public schools, grade and vocational, at Spring Mills, and in other portions of Gregg township, were closed during last week, due to the severe cold and difficulty pupils experienced in reaching the schoolrooms from their homes.

Mr. and Mrs. Guy Corman, C. B. Stover and Miss Josephine Stover were among those who visited the Farm Show for several days, and on their way home became stranded, which brought to them experiences not soon forgotten.

Due to roads being blocked with snow, Spring Mills was cut off from the surrounding country for a few days. While the main highways were open since Saturday, the Georges Valley sections cannot be reached in the more modern way of travel.

The ice on Pennas Creek, at the Green Briar bridge, near Rotes Mill, has attained a thickness of fifteen inches.

Miss Catharine Agman, daughter of W. C. Auman, who was at her home here, returned to DuBois to resume her work in the PWA office at that place.

Sherwood Decker, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Decker, heretofore noted as being ill, is somewhat improved. Likewise is the case with the son of John Albright and the Houser lads.

C. B. Stover, like most plumbers in extreme cold weather, has been very busy in various sections thawing out frozen water pipes, and these are not always the most pleasant jobs.

Mrs. W. M. Flegle, of Maywood New Jersey, visited her father, W. A. Neese, over the week-end. Mrs. Flegle is connected with the Home Loan Corporation and is quartered at Wilkesbarre. Business connected with the HLC brought her to Lewisburg during the latter part of the week, and being that near to the family hearth, the opportunity was seized to sit by it again.

The ailed ride and party planned by the Young People's group for this (Thursday) evening is yet a question, and all depend on how high mercury can rise today and how gentle the winds blow. Youth, however, will not be put off without a sufficient reason.

Blue Ball Project May Be Completed - The Gregg township road construction project requiring 25 men five months to complete at a cost of \$10,820.55, was passed on favorably by Administrator Freeman, head of the DuBois office. From what can be gathered this is a continuation of the Blue Ball project, commenced two years ago. The project is sponsored by the Gregg township road supervisors.

Location Study of Route 45 Thru Spring Mills - A location study is being made of State Highway Route No. 45 through Spring Mills. In making the more recent surveys on this route a section from the Allison mansion on the west side of Spring Mills to a point approximately opposite the Segal home on the east side of the town has been omitted. At this time this particular section is being given attention by a group of surveyors headed by N. C. Malna. A study was made of the possibilities on the south side of the

Vocational school building, going over or around the hill to the west, and at present a study is almost completed of a tentative route running several hundred feet north of the bridge over Pennas Creek. Beginning at the old high school site a short distance east of the Allison farm barn on the east side of town, the proposed new route shears off the present route to the west, over the hill back of the Fetters residence, crosses the Farmers Mills road, over the dam, passing close to the north side of the Detwiler hotel stable and on through the Wm. Bressler barn, where it strikes Route 45 at the turn and again follows it westward.

It must be understood, however, that this route, like all others laid out heretofore, is only a trial. Where the road will be located remains a question. One thing indicated by these maneuvers is that when constructed, concrete will be the material used.

Spring Mills will lose one of its families next spring when Mr. and Mrs. Jacob P. Sharer move onto their farm, along State highway route No. 95, east of Centre Hall, purchased six years ago from Harry Frankenberg, the farm long known as the Weaver place, and tenanted since by Frank White, a brother-in-law.

Mr. Sharer has been employed in the Groce Silk mill for eleven or twelve years, during much of which time he occupied a sub-boss position, and for about the same length of time Mrs. Sharer has been an operator in the Spring Mills telephone exchange. The change of occupation is being made to give the couple larger freedom.

The attendance at the State Farm Show, Harrisburg, from Spring Mills was much interfered with by a raging blizzard, consequently the number from here who undertook the trip to the State capital was much smaller than a year ago. Those who did attend were all connected with some activity as was related in this column a week ago.

Russell Condo, one of the local school faculty, is being sought as a referee in basketball games, due to his alertness and fairness in his decisions. He recently was called to act in that capacity in a game at Petersburg, between a team of the Vocational schools at Martinsburg and Petersburg, on a floor at the latter place. Mr. Condo was accompanied to Petersburg by Mrs. Condo, who is also a school sports enthusiast.
