

ITEMS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Thomas L. Moore, teacher in the borough grade schools, was off duty a few days last week owing to illness.

Logan Grange, Pleasant Gap, will give a musical comedy entitled "College Inn," Thursday and Friday evenings. The play will be directed by Margaret Calkins, trained in the work.

Miss Cora Luse, a teacher for a number of years in the Altoona City schools, was here over the week-end with her mother, whose physical condition has not been at all favorable during the past few months.

Sunday was a beautiful day from morning until night, although the air was brisk. During the early evening mercury dropped to within a few degrees of zero. Monday morning clouds overcast the sky.

The two plants operated by the Chemical Lime company, in Bellefonte, closed Friday night, due to labor wage difficulties. It is claimed. The shutdown affects about 150 laborers, but none in the office force.

The Penn township school board is sponsoring a WPA project to grade the school grounds adjoining the consolidated grade school building at Coburn. The movement will cause an expenditure of \$7023, and give 42 men employment for three months.

Due to the resignation of Albert W. Watts, postmaster at McVoytown since 1928, a Civil Service examination will be held to fill the vacancy. James R. Kimberly has been named acting postmaster. The office is of the third class, with a salary of \$1,400.00.

The class of ladies under the direction of Miss Eleanor Smith, home economics extension worker for Centre county, will be held on Friday afternoon, 2:00 o'clock, at the home of Mrs. J. S. Boozer instead of at the T. L. Smith home as previously announced.

The 80th annual sessions of the West Susquehanna Classis were held in St. John's Reformed church, Mifflinburg, the Rev. Ira W. Frantz, pastor, on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The Rev. D. R. Keener and Elder David K. Keller were representatives of the local Reformed church.

Miles Aikey, 15 years old, son of Clark Aikey, Bellefonte, was accidentally hit by a bullet from a 22-calibre rifle while in a shooting gallery in Bellefonte, on Thursday. The ball was removed in an operation performed in the Centre County hospital the day following the accident. The bullet entered the right hip, hit the pelvis bone and lodged near the abdomen.

Both the McCoy brothers—Frank and Samuel—in Philadelphia, are in a bad plight. Frank, a Pullman car conductor on the P. R. R., is a patient in the Presbyterian hospital due to a broken leg, following a fall down a stairway, and Samuel, employed by the Philadelphia Traction company as a conductor, has been confined to his home for five weeks from illness, the nature of which has not been learned. The information was obtained from G. H. McCormick, Pottery Mills, who obtained no further details.

W. E. LEE UNDERGOES PANCREAS OPERATION

Sunday morning at 10:00 o'clock, W. E. Lee underwent a pancreas operation, which consists of draining the organ, in the Centre County hospital. He became ill Friday morning, the pains he suffered appearing to him to be due to indigestion. Throughout Friday and Saturday his condition failed to improve, resulting in the decision to remove him to the hospital early Sunday morning.

The hospital authorities, at 10:30 Wednesday morning, reported Mr. Lee had experienced an uncomfortable night, but that his condition was not at all hopeless.

Later—At 12:30 P. M., a messenger from the hospital reported Mr. Lee's condition had become more serious; in fact, very serious.

The patient is fifty-four years old, and enjoyed reasonably good health until recently.

REFORMED CHURCH CLASSIS MEETS AT MIFFLINBURG

Two hundred or more persons engaged in the 80th annual sessions of the West Susquehanna Classis of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, held at Mifflinburg, on Tuesday and Wednesday.

The convention attracted delegates from 59 churches and 56 church schools scattered throughout Union, Snyder and Centre counties, and embracing also the churches of Williamsport, Lock Haven and Lewisport.

The total communicant membership is nearly 7,000, and the constituency more than 10,000 persons. One of the most important items of business listed for the consideration at the classis meeting was the preliminary draft of the constitution suggested by a committee of the General Synod, for the government of the newly unified Evangelical and Reformed churches.

The portion most immediately affecting this vicinity is that which would create of the West and East Susquehanna and the Wyoming classes a single unit, to be known as the Susquehanna Synod.

HEAD-ON COLLISION INJURES COLLEGE STUDENTS, MONDAY

Three Penn State students, Miss Annie McCaughey, a senior, 20, of Germantown; Miss Mary E. Unger, a freshman, of State College; Herbert E. Unger, 19, a sophomore, of State College; also, Harry K. Pifer, Reynoldsville, were seriously injured in a head-on automobile collision on Route 322 between the two gas stations at Bolsburg, on Monday night. Miss Caughey suffered a fractured skull, while the others suffered lesser injuries, yet serious.

Others slightly injured were Roy Stamm, a sophomore; Henry Beard, a junior, and Miss Dorothy Boette. Herbert Unger was the driver of the car in which the students were passengers, and Pifer was the operator of the second car.

Both machines were badly damaged.

J. A. Heckman is able to be about but continues to have a slight limp due to an attack of sciatica in the leg. He was first reported to have had lumbago.

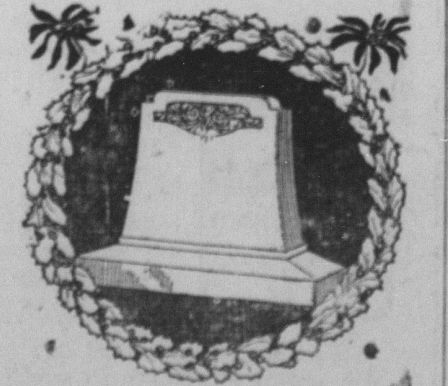
