We are authorized to announce the name of John W. Decker, of Greag Township, as a candidate for the office of Representative in the General Assembly, subject to the rules governing the Democratic party as expressed at the primary election to be held Tuesday, April 23, 1936.

Borough council has caused a notice to be published this week threatening to make property owners meet the expenses of having sidewalks cleaned of snow where such duty was not performed by said owners. And at the same time the council has been remiss in its duty of cleaning the town's cross streets. Entering from a cross street onto the main thoroughfare has been a task not only difficult but in some instances well nigh impossible. Surely this is not a task for the individual to perform. So when council sees a delay in the removal of snow from the sidewalks by the citizen, let it take a look in its own back yard.

Centre county received \$5,359 as its share of a total of \$1,065,512 distributed to Fireman relief associations in the sixty-five counties in the State. This sum represents the accumulated balance in the State fire insurance tax fund as of December 31, 1932, authorized by the last legislature to be appropriated to "cities, townships and boroughs for payment to firemen's relief pension and retirement funds."

**LEADERSHIP TRAINING SCHOOL**  
EXPLANATION OF COURSES

In order to bring the purpose of the Centre Hall Community Leadership Training School clearly before the people of the community, Rev. Seth Russell and Prof. J. F. Wetzel, instructors, have prepared summaries of the courses they will offer.

**Course 314B. Methods for Guidance of Youth Groups.**  
(By Rev. Seth W. Russell)

This course is intended for teachers and leaders who desire to become more capable in teaching and counseling boys and girls and young people between the ages of twelve and twenty years.

Among the chief problems of teachers of this age group today is the development of skill in teaching and leading toward a stimulating interest of youth in the church. "Holding the Young People" has become an acute problem for most churches and church schools. This condition emphasizes the importance of such a course of training as this one. To the greatest possible extent, the practical problems of the local church schools will be taken as the basis of the course.

Projects will be worked out, using local church school situations as project materials. Methods, proven by use, will be presented to class members and their possibility of adaptation to local church schools will be discussed. Supplementing the methods mentioned will be a text, "Leading Youth to Abundant Life," by C. A. Miller.

**Course 314C. My Christian Belief.**  
(By Prof. J. F. Wetzel)

People in general who take life seriously are confronted with many problems in their religious thinking. Some of these problems have been a source of confusion. With these questions as a basis the course "My Christian Beliefs" has been provided.

In the course we plan to develop a more intelligent and satisfying Christian faith; try to determine what constitutes the essentials of Christian belief; endeavor to form a concept of God and a philosophy of religious living which shall take account of the historic value of the Christian religion and modern scientific knowledge.

The background of the course is truly Biblical and no attempt will be made to have pupils accept a "new faith", but rather to so guide through our discussions that hazy ideas may become clearer, confused beliefs untangled, and that the faith which we now have develop into a more vital and meaningful one.
