**Sunday School Convention.**—Districts 11 and 12 of the Centre Co. Sabbath School Assn. held a joint convention at Spring Mills in the M. E. church, Thursday evening. The meeting was presided over by M. T. Zabler, president of District 11. Well over 100 persons were present. The male chorus directed by Albert Stover, president of district 12, rendered a number of excellent selections. The group divided and went over the business of the respective districts. The ice field is elevated to the height of about three feet from the floor level and has a total of 135 cans, the dimensions of which are 17x22x32 inches, giving the field a capacity of 27,000 pounds, or 13 1/2 tons. An ice storage room is also being constructed.
