**SALE OF SEALS FOR CRIPPLES**

WILL BEGIN MARCH 29

At a meeting of the Centre-Clearfield Crippled Children's Society to be held today (Thursday) in the nurses' home of the Phillipsburg State Hospital, plans will be made for the coming seal sale to begin the last Sunday in this month.

Miss Anna Lauman, superintendent at the Phillipsburg State Hospital, furnishes a brief statement of the work done during the past year:

Eleven all-day clinics; 7 half-day clinics; 642 examinations made; 52 operations performed; 79 casts applied; 75 X-ray examinations made; 131 physiotherapy treatments given; 1371 days of hospitalization; 100 new cases.

The total cost of the Crippled Children's work was \$8,393.10.

Of this the Department of Health contributed \$860.82; of this the hospital hospitalization to the value of \$5471.09; of this the local Crippled Children's Society, \$1792.81.

In addition to these there were individuals who contributed transportation, teaching of hospitalized children, Dr. Galbraith contributed each follow up clinic and Dr. Lynn contributed the services of his assistant to help with the operative work.

While in the past something has been done in this connection in Centre Hall and immediate vicinity, the ground work is about to be laid for a wider and more systematic appeal for the sale of the seals.

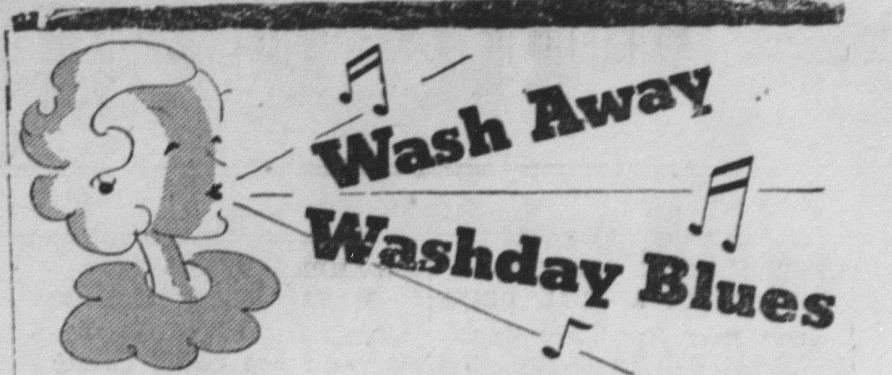

go fly a kite

But don't be an Amateur...

It takes a lot of skill and knowledge to fly a kite. To get the kite up in the air is not difficult. The trick is to get the kite down again without damaging it or losing any string. Then too, there are certain dangers to life and limb which the expert knows how to avoid. Below is a list of the rules that a real kite-flyer never forgets. Follow this guide if you are a beginner and with a little experience you will soon become an expert.

**An Expert Follows These Rules:**

1. NEVER FLY KITE OVER ELECTRIC or TROLLEY WIRES or NEAR TRANSMISSION TOWERS. Keep away from houses, trees and far from streets or roads. You cannot watch your kite and traffic, too!
2. Use good strong cord, NEVER WIRE or TINSEL and remember, wet string will conduct electricity and lightning. Make sure the cord is securely tied to your winding stick.
3. Use no metal parts that would cause a "short" if your kite should land on wires.
4. When the kite darts from side to side haul it down and add more tail.
5. Keep a steady pull on the string at all times. Haul the kite down quickly if the wind slackens.
6. If your kite should land on wires or pole, don't climb after it. NO KITE IS WORTH RISKING LIFE OR LIMB. Never try to knock it down with sticks or stones. You are sure to damage the kite so that it will be worthless anyway, and you may damage wires, putting out the lights in many homes.
