From this statement it will be readily seen that a district with \$604,445 taxable property, the proposed increase in indebtedness, if sanctioned by the voters at the election to be held on April 28 will not work a hardship on any taxpayer.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the electors of the School District of the Township of Gregg, County of Centre, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, that pursuant to resolution duly passed by the Board of Directors of said School District of the Township of Gregg, on the 27th day of January, 1936, a

SPECIAL ELECTION will be held in the School District of the Township of Gregg, County of Centre, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, on TUESDAY, APRIL 28TH, 1936, at the same places and during the same hours to-wit: between 7:00 A. M. and 7:00 P. M. (Eastern Standard Time) under the same regulations as provided by law for the holding of general and municipal elections in said School District of the Township of Gregg.

The purpose for which said election will be held is to obtain the assent of the electors of the said School District of the Township of Gregg to an increase in the bonded indebtedness thereof, to an amount exceeding two (2%) per centum and not exceeding seven (7%) per centum upon the last preceding assessed valuation of property in said School District of the Township of Gregg, taxable for school purposes by issuing bonds of the School District of the Township of Gregg in the manner permitted by law.

1. The amount of the last preceding assessed valuation of property in the Township of Gregg taxable for school purposes is \$604,445.00.

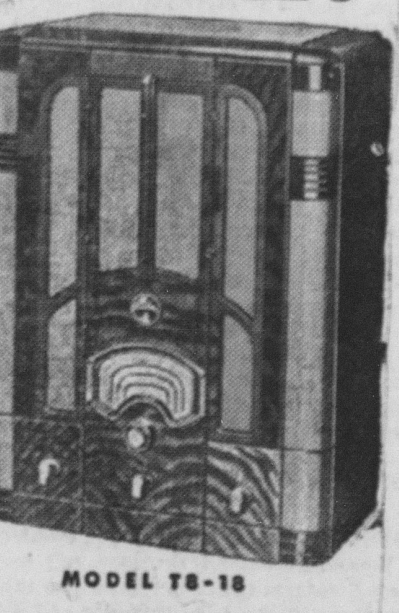

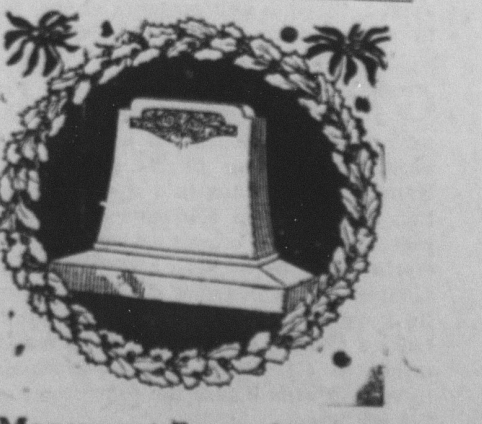
