BILLION AND HALF ASKED BY F. D. R. FOR WORK RELIEF

President Roosevelt on Thursday asked Congress for a new appropriation of \$1,500,000,000 to finance next year's work relief program. This sum added to a \$1,000,000,000 carry-over from the current year's \$4,000,000,000 relief fund, plus \$500,000,000 already appropriated by Congress for the Civilian Conservation Corps, will bring the total sum available for relief next year to \$3,000,000,000. This compares with \$3,500,000,000 the President stated is being spent for relief purposes this year.

The President in his special message to Congress gave no details regarding the \$1,500,000,000 outlay for relief this year. There are reliable indications that not quite all this sum will actually be expended by June 30, and the end of the current fiscal year, and that as much as several hundred million dollars may be added to the \$1,000,000,000 carry-over.

The trend of unemployment is upward, the President said, "but this trend, at its present rate of progress, is inadequate. I propose, therefore, that we ask private business to extend its operations so as to absorb an increasing number of the unemployed. "Frankly, there is little evidence that large and small employers by individual and unco-ordinated action can absorb large numbers of new employees. A vigorous effort on a national scale is necessary by voluntary, concerted action of private industry."

In effect, the President challenged the leaders of industry, who have been leading the chorus of wails about "regimentation," the "unbalanced budget," and "Government extravagance," to make possible the proposed reductions in relief expenditures. If they fail to make good, the inference was clear in the President's message, not only will relief expenditures have to be increased but the Government will be forced to assume increased responsibility for the conduct of private business.

"My appeal is to the thinking men who are assured of their daily bread," he declared. "However, we may be divided along lines of economic or political faith, all right-minded Americans have a common stake in extending production, and in getting away from the burdens of relief."

In the future WPA workmen will be required to work for their money. According to orders issued in Harrisburg there will not be any allowance for sickness or bad weather. All time lost because of either one of both will have to be made up by working overtime during the current month or the time lost will be deducted from the pay check.

There are also five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Meyer had just returned from the midnight Lenten services at the Lutheran church, a few doors from her home, when she was stricken. Her body was found by her niece, Mrs. James A. Stover, who, with her husband and young son, occupy part of the duplex house, and who heard the elderly lady fall to the floor.
