**PENNSYLVANIA STATE HOTEL ASSOCIATION TALKS ON ROADS**  
The Pennsylvania State Hotel Association in speaking of damage done to roads throughout the State, concludes with these statements:  
"The permanent types of road are standing the excessive weather damage exceptionally well, according to reports we have gotten. There have been instances of heaving in concrete roads, due to frost emergence, but in practically every case, the pavement has settled normally back into place with the stopping of the frost action. The fact is no real damage has been done to concrete roads by frost action."  
"On the other hand, however, this is far from the case with the rural roads. Even the best constructed macadam roads are now full of potholes, raveled edges, loose stone, and in many cases the so-called 'pinch' roads' surfaces have disappeared entirely. This is eloquent proof that Pennsylvania must engage in a program of rational, sound highway planning. The present Administration at Harrisburg has made a splendid start in this direction through the inauguration of a long-range planning board. We believe they will continue this good work, but nevertheless it is the responsibility of every motorist and every citizen to insist upon a sound, balanced program of highway development. This requires first of all that every cent of available highway revenue be spent on the highways and for no other purpose. If that is not done, we shall soon see the complete demoralization of our highways with the consequential depressing effect upon all business and industry; in fact upon the life and living of the entire State."
