ROBINSON.—Dr. Gerald Austin Robinson, who in his early teens lived with his parents in Centre Hall, died at his home in Bellefonte, Wednesday morning of last week.

Military funeral services were held from his late home in Bellefonte, on Friday, in charge of the members of the American Legion.

Dr. Robinson was born at Mingo-ville, on Oct. 13, 1894, the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Robinson, and was aged 41 years, 6 months and 2 days. He was graduated from the Milesburg high school, Bellefonte Academy and attended Penn State College for one

year. He then enlisted for service during the World War at Bellefonte in 1917 in the 101st U. S. Cavalry and later was assigned as second lieutenant of Company G, 111th Infantry and served in France, being wounded in the battle of the Argonne.

On May 3rd, 1919, he was discharged at Camp Dix, N. J., and shortly after his arrival home entered the University of Pittsburgh dental school, graduating four years later. In October, 1924, he came to Bellefonte and began his dental practice on West High street, remaining there until 1934 when he gave up his practice owing to his ill health.

Praternally he was a member of the Bellefonte Lodge B. P. O. E., the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Nittany County Club and was Commander of the Brooks-Doll Post No. 33, American Legion, having been elected to that office last fall. He was a prominent athlete and sportsman and enjoyed a wide circle of friends who mourn his demise.

December 25th, 1922, he was united in marriage to Miss Frances Clemow who survives with two children, Gerald Austin Robinson, Jr., and Carolyn, both at home. One brother, Elwood Robinson, of Milesburg, and one sister, Mrs. Halvor L. Harvey, of Atlantic City, also survive.

SHAFER.—Ellis B. Shaffer, 56, well known Lock Haven business man, died at his home two hours after he had been stricken with heart trouble. Twenty-seven years ago he went into partnership with H. H.
