LOCALS.

The local high school athletic field, particularly the baseball diamond, was repaired and remodeled. On Wednesday the ground was packed by the use of a steam roller. Due to a portion of the left field now being occupied by the foundation for the high school auditorium and gym, the diamond was shifted several degrees to the northwest.

George L. Goodhart and Albert L. Emery are the only fishermen in this section who have been able to land trout of any size and number worthy of mention. Contractor Henszey is on the lot much of the time, and soon a herd of inspectors will appear from time to time.

AMERICAN CROP LOANS AVAILABLE TODAY, THURS.

Applications for Emergency Crop Loans will be received at Bellefonte at the Post Office, on Thursday, April 23, at 1:30 p. m. by State Supervisor Louis E. Shucker of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration. The Emergency Crop Loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain farm any other source. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1936 crops, and in no instance will they exceed \$20 to one farmer.

Farmers who have loans with the Production Credit Association, or the Restatement Administration will be considered ineligible.

Farmers who are eligible and wishing to take advantage of this loan should be at the place mentioned on time; the season for these loans will close shortly, and Mr. Shucker may not be able to be in this territory again.
