The Department of Internal Affairs gives high spots in the counties in Pennsylvania. Referring to Centre county, this note appears: Centre County.—Highest point, 2,580 feet in S. W. corner on Allegheny Mt.; S. corner (Harris Twp.) 2,520 feet; Tussey Mt. (Bald Knob) 2,300 feet; Nittany Mt., 2,240 feet.

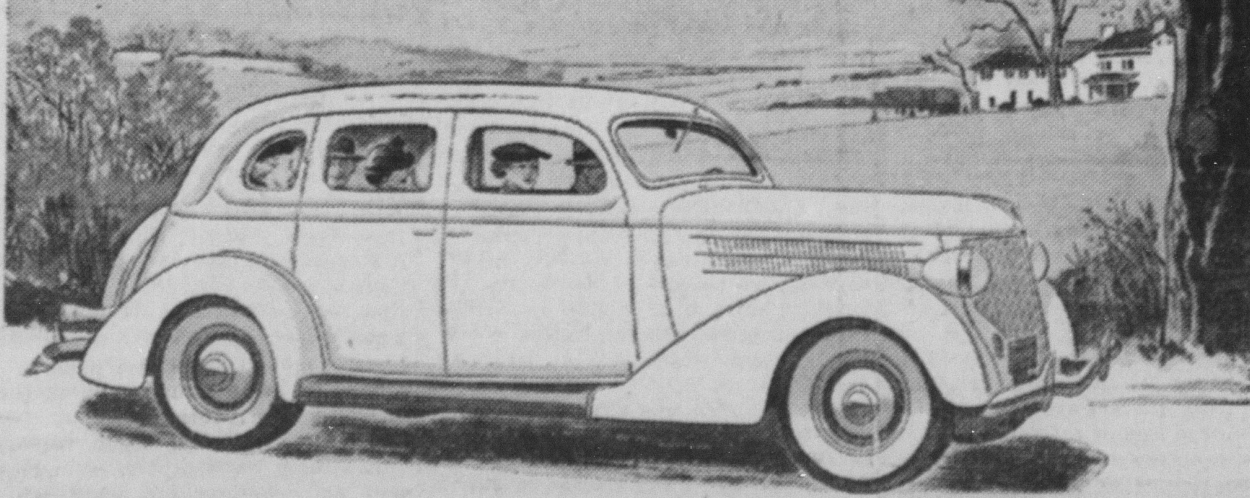

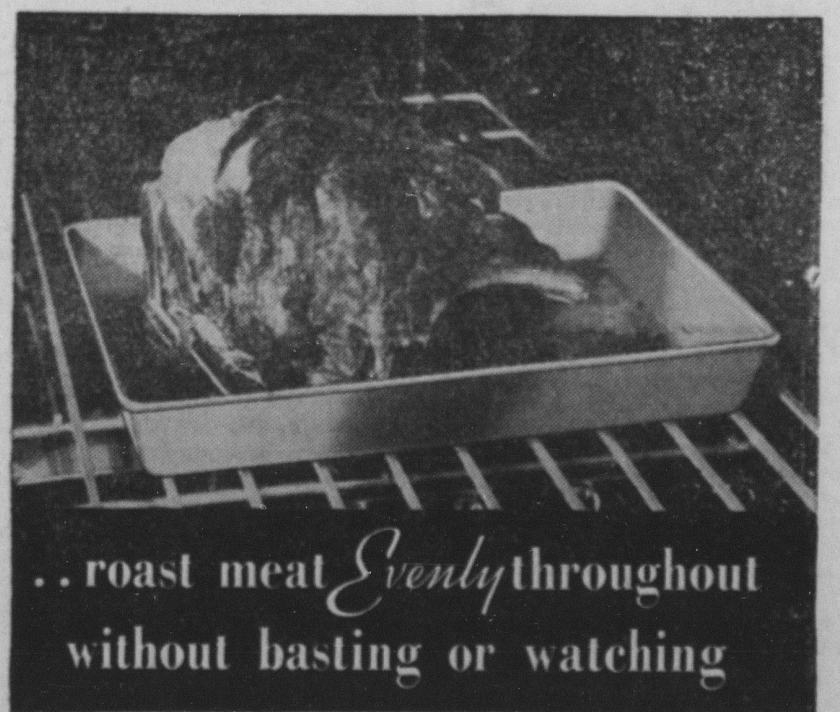
