Silver Lining Shows for Grant.

There is now a possible and probable favorable outlook for Gregg Twp. Vocational School to receive the usual 45% grant for the equipping of the assembly and gym ground for which was broken two weeks ago. The brightened outlook for this favor from the Federal Government is due to the fact that only recently \$19,000,000 has been set aside for school and other PWA projects just begun throughout Pennsylvania.

Vocational Education Gets Boost.

Gregg Twp. Vocational school and other similar schools throughout the nation will be greatly benefited by a measure passed by congress appropriating annually \$12,000,000, beginning with the fiscal year of July 1, 1937. Formerly the states were required to match Federal appropriations for vocational education, on the 100 percent basis. However, under the provisions of the George bill, the states and their minor sub-divisions will be required to match Federal appropriations to the extent of only 50 percent until the year 1942.

Beginning with the year 1943, there is to be a 10 percent step-up annually, under which arrangement state and local funds must equal the Federal appropriation by the year '47. Clyde Sweeney, 11-year-old son of James Sweeney of Penns Cave, has attended Logan school in Gregg township for five years and during that time he has been neither tardy nor absent. The boy has walked the two miles from his home to the school every day during the five terms and usually has been the first pupil to get there. Neglected Graves of Revolutionary War Soldiers.—Some time ago it was requested that all graves of Revolutionary War soldiers not properly marked and decorated be reported. The following is a list of such graves as reported by C. C. Bartsch, Spring Mills: Christian Gast, originally from Rebersburg, one of C. C. Bartsch's ancestors, buried in the east side of the cemetery at Geeseytown, near Frankstown, Blair county; born Sept. 25, 1762; died Sept. 25, 1843, aged 89 years.

Ludwig Rishel, buried at Union cemetery near Lucy Musser home, Penn Hall, W. P. Rishel's ancestor, and four times great grandfather of Mrs. D. S. Braucht and Mrs. H. S. Meyer.

Philip Grove, buried at Union cemetery, Farmers Mills, one of Gardner Grove's ancestors.

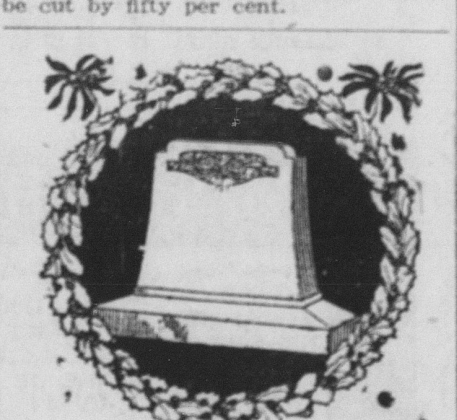
G. Frank Smith and family of Centre Hall visited at the W. M. Sweeney home on Sunday.
