KERR.—Mrs. Myra J. Kerr passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. (Rev.) Elmer L. Williams, in Chicago, on Sunday, May 24, at the age of 86 years, 10 months and 13 days. For almost fifteen years past Mrs. Kerr had lived in the home of her daughter.

Myra J. Kerr was born July 5th, 1849, on a farm near Centre Hill, to Michael and Catharine Wagner Strohm. She was the third of nine children, all of whom had preceded her to the life beyond.

January 2nd, 1872, she was united in marriage to William A. Kerr. To them were born Rollin S., now of Fontana, California; Kathryn (Mrs. Elmer L. Williams, of Chicago, and William E., of Ogden, Utah.

Mrs. Kerr is also survived by two grandchildren, Mrs. Laura Lynn Williams Tucher, of Keesville, N. Y., and Momi Williams, of Chicago. A third grandchild, Channing B. Williams, passed away May 8th in Chicago.

Mrs. Kerr spent the years of her married life on a farm along Sinking creek, near Egg Hill. After the death of her husband, in 1900, she lived for a time in Spring Mills, then in Centre Hall. From 1904 to 1921 she kept the home for her son, William, in Omaha, Nebraska.

The body was shipped to Centre Hall, arriving Tuesday forenoon, and at 4:00 p. m. of that day interment was made in the family plot in the Sprucetown cemetery. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Seth Russell, of the Methodist church. The funeral services were held from the home of a niece, Mrs. W. F. Bradford, in Centre Hall.
