ZERBY.—The community was shocked on hearing of the death of Mrs. John W. Zerby, at the cabin of Poe Valley Mountain fire tower, in Seven Mountains, where he son, Henry, was the keeper. Mrs. Zerby had visited the tower the week previous and appeared to be benefited from the quiet, so the experiment was to be repeated. She went to the cabin on Wednesday, and on Thursday night was stricken with cerebral apoplexy, becoming unconscious at once and remaining in that condition until Sunday morning, 12:30, when death released her.

Funeral services were held at the home near Farmers Mills and continued in the Union church at 10:00 a. m., Wednesday morning, Rev. L. A. Wagner officiating, assisted by Rev. D. R. Keener. Burial was made in the cemetery close by.

Annie Mary Hosterman, the maiden name of the deceased, was born Oct. 11, 1882, near Wolfe Chapel, in Haines township, a daughter of Robert and Sara J. (Wolf) Hosterman. Her marriage to John W. Zerby took place July 23, 1896. She was the mother of thirteen children, all surviving her except one, Dorothy Emeline. The living are Mrs. Mary E. Luse and Robert H., Centre Hall, R. D.; Mrs. Sara J. Brungart, Rebersburg; Mrs. Alma C. Hagan, Centre Hall; Naomi M. Zerby, Woodward; Mrs. Bessie C. Fink, Philipsburg; Maude E. and Henry W., at home; A. Irene, Clearfield; J. Eugene, Miriam R. and Frances, at home. There are also five grandchildren and the husband surviving, as well as a brother, G. W. Hosterman, Aaronsburg, and two sisters, Mrs. H. F. Stover, Aaronsburg, and Mrs. E. F. Orndorf, Woodward.

Mrs. Zerby and her family lived at their present home in Gregg township for twenty-nine years. She was an "at home" person, devoting her efforts to the comfort and welfare of her family. She was a member of the Lutheran church for fifty years, and instilled its teachings in her children and practiced it consistently in everyday life.

HOMAN.—Mrs. Annie E. Homan, widow of Henry E. Homan, died at her home in Centre Hall on Tuesday night at 11:25 o'clock, from complications. During the last few days of her life she lay in a state of coma.

While living at the latter place he conducted a studio in Centre Hall for a few years, opening the place several days each week.

He was a member of the Methodist church and the L. O. O. F. In June, 1889 he married Miss Harriett Hamilton, who survives with two sons, Charles H. Smith, of Oswego, N. Y., and Guy M. Smith, of State College. One sister and a half-brother also survive.
