HEVERLY.—At the age of fifty years, James Orvis Heverly died very suddenly at his home in Bellefonte, on Sunday, from a heart attack.

Mr. Heverly erected the Heverly building in which he conducted a sporting goods store; was a former treasurer of Centre county and the hands of the Republican party, and during Pinchot's administration was a State Workman's Insurance Fund administrator.

The deceased was born at Mount Eagle, near Howard, the son of Elsworth and Lucy Heverly, both deceased. He is survived by his wife, Mabel Strunk Heverly, and three children: Cameron R., Earl and Betty, all of Bellefonte. Two sisters, Mrs. Della Lucas and Mrs. George Miller, both of Tyrone, and one brother, Stanley Heverly, of Cleveland, O., also survive.

LONG.—Two years' illness, originating with a stroke, preceded the death Monday night, July 20, of Clement Long, at his home in Colby, Ohio. He was aged 64 years, 6 months and 13 days.

Born in Millheim, this county, January 7, 1872, a son of Jacob and Sophia (Musser) Long, he spent the earlier days of his life there and in young manhood was united in marriage with Miss Ella Rachau, who preceded him in death 30 years ago. To this union were born two children, Mrs. Emma Smith, of Havana, and Ernest, at home.

Surviving with the four children are 19 grandchildren, one great-grandchild, two sisters, Mrs. George Long, Penns Cave (Centre Hall, R. D.); Mrs. Harvey Royer, Bellevue, O.; one brother, John Long, of Albany, N. Y.

Burial was made in Bellevue, Ohio, cemetery.
