UNION CO.'S WEST END FAIR TO HAVE FINE FEATURES

Visitors to the Union County West End Fair this year will witness a sensational 80-foot diving act, performed by a young man from Melborn, Fla. Every space in the 230-foot commercial exhibitors' building has been taken and the midway will be filled with rides and other concessions, making the largest midway the fair has ever had.
