Two Worthwhile Vocational School Projects—Two Gregg Township Vocational School projects carried on by Eugene and Leona Wolfe, children of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Wolfe, are particularly worthy of notice at this time. Eugene completed his project on Friday when he sold twenty-six of twenty-seven pigs for feeders to Mrs. Mary Kidder Stuart, State College, at 12 cents per pound, the gross sum being \$316.80. The pigs, litters of three sows, were farrowed from May 8 to 10, and had never been in an open until the day before they were sold, and were crosses of Durock and Berkshire, and Durock and Chester-white. Their age at time of sale was approximately two weeks less than four months. For most of the time the pigs were fed from a self-feeder, the bulk of the feed having been ground wheat and oats. In making calculations of the probable profit, the fact remains that the choice pig in the lot was not sold.

The second project carried out was by Leona, who started in with three bronze turkey hens, and at this time has a fine flock of birds numbering 138. The hens, in addition to producing eggs for hatching, furnished much "hen fruit" for the table.

Portion of S. H. Route 45 to Be Rebuilt—14,275 linear feet of State Highway Route No. 45 is to be rebuilt. The portion lies between the Slegal home and the old tollgate at the Stover farm, where it meets the rebuilt section extending to the Centre-Union county line. This is good news and adds to the furnishing of a better road, will give work to a considerable number of men. Bids will be opened Friday, Sept. 13.

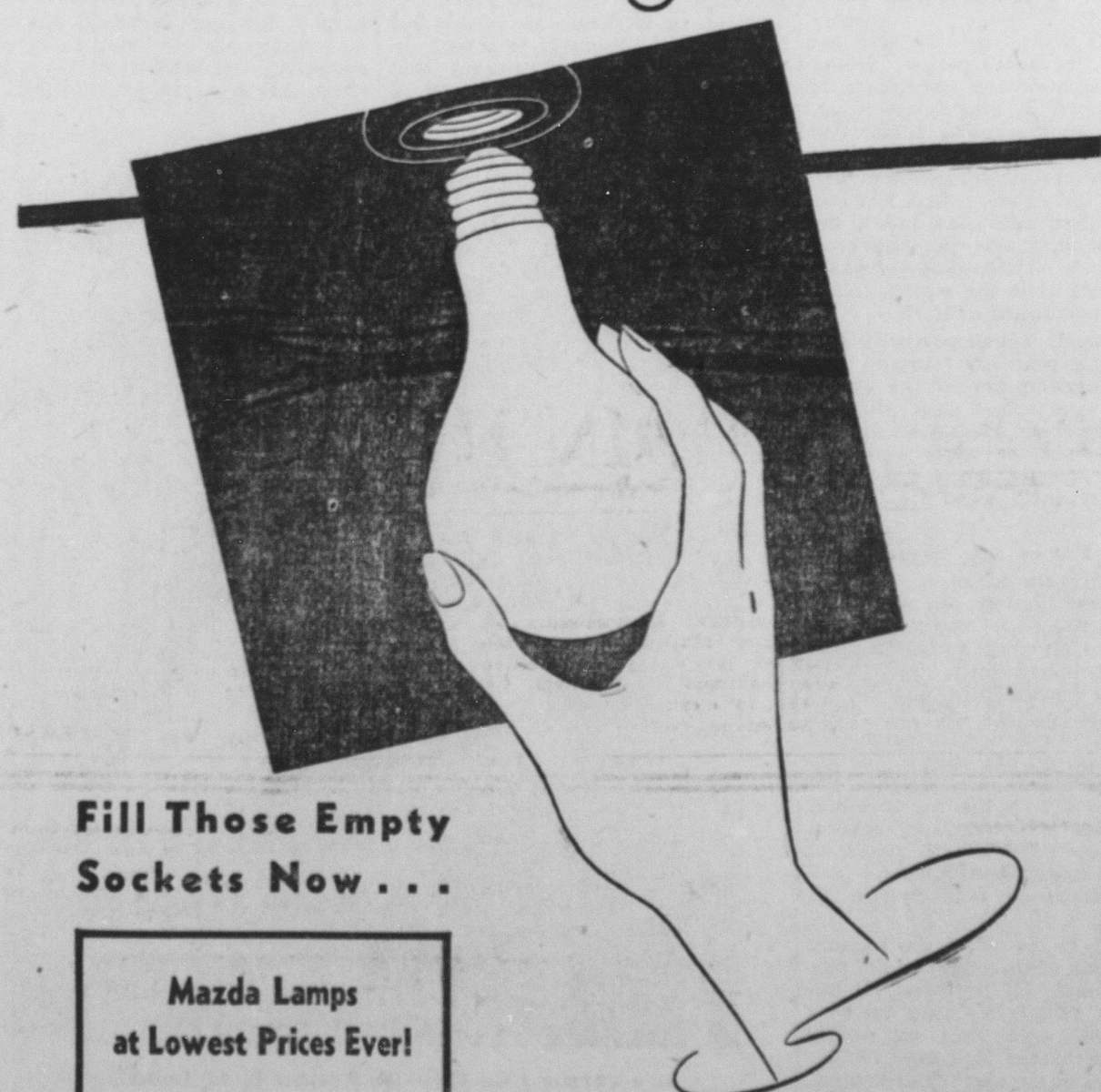
