Road Construction to Begin—The building of a portion of State Highway Route 45, lying between the Musser farm and the Dan Siegal home, a distance of 14,276 linear feet, is about to begin.

In a general way the road will follow the present road until it reaches Penn Hall bridge, near the Condo Garage, where it will be shifted to the north, so that the center of the new highway will be close to the north abutment of the present bridge.
