Mrs. Catharine Bodorf is spending some time in Millroy with Charles Bodorf and family.

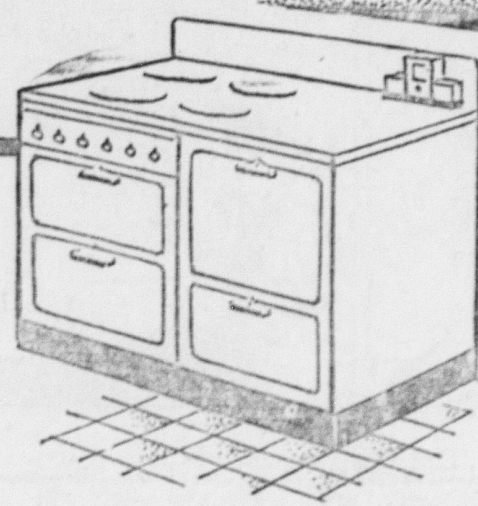
