TIGERS LOSE TO HUBLERSBURG

The Centre Hall Tigers, who have been tied for first place with State College, lost to Hublersburg in the return game on Friday, 2-1. The local eleven had previously beaten the same team 1-0.

The Tigers at no time in the game displayed the power and dash they showed against State and Boalsburg. This sluggishness might have resulted, however, from a necessary last minute change in the lineup due to the absence of one of the regular forwards.

Hublersburg converted a penalty kick in the first three minutes of play to make the score 1-0.

There was little excitement throughout the remainder of the game until, in the last minute of play, Captain Walker made good a penalty kick to even the score.

Two five-minute periods were then agreed upon to break the tie. Centre Hall drove the ball into the home team's territory only to have fullback Kerns return it out of danger. In the closing minutes of play a Hublersburg forward drove home the winning run to make the final score Hublersburg, 2; Centre Hall, 1.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Feed Sows Liberally—Feeding the brood sows heavily for about two weeks before breeding tends to increase the possible number of pigs in the litter 10 to 20 per cent. While the ration should be rather high in protein, it is essential that the sows also continue to gain in flesh.

Stop Feather Picking—When turkeys eat feathers the vice may be controlled by feeding clover, alfalfa, or soybean hay. A supply of fibrous grains, such as oats, barley, and buckwheat, helps to curb the habit.

Keep Apples Cool—Apples keep best in storage when the temperature is about 32 degrees Fahrenheit. When the temperature is too high, the apples ripen rapidly, soften and exhaust their reserves. Very low temperatures prevent proper development of the fruit.

Reduce Production Costs—Economy in milk production results from good dairy herd management. Efficiency in cattle, economy in operation, and quality in products are watchwords for dairymen if the greatest profits are to be realized.

Meet Storage Needs—Pumpkins and squashes require cool, dry storage conditions. Sweet potatoes need slightly higher temperature and humidity. Onions keep best in a cool, medium-dry storage.

Gives Vitamin Results—Bulletin 234 published by the Agricultural Experiment Station, State College, Pa., tells what happened in tests on the vitamin D requirement of growing chicks and laying hens.

Mulch Strawberry Bed—Use material as free from seeds as possible for mulching the strawberry bed or trouble with weeds will develop.

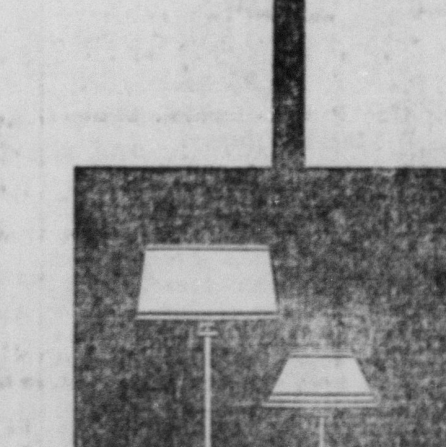
