A VISIONED ARTICLE FROM THE REPORTER OF NOV. 5, '36

Franklin Delano Roosevelt was re-elected President of the United States by a popular vote variously estimated, and by a handsome plurality of Presidential Electors. Pivotal states, long declared so, swung into line for Roosevelt, with reasonably fair majorities.

Pennsylvania, carried heretofore by Republicans by majorities ranging from over a million down to 200,000, is yet in dispute.

Democratic candidates for Congress and Assembly, Gingery and Decker, respectively, succeed themselves.

All the disgruntled Democrat, in "examining the record," finds his clowning for Landon rendered an important service in the election. All the states in which he spoke, claimed by the Democrats, gave majorities for Roosevelt.

It is acknowledged Republican leaders, including candidate Landon, overplayed the "evils" of the New Deal.

In the county, John Love's letters to Democrats asking for campaign contributions, was a contributing factor in maintaining the usual Democratic majority in Penns Valley.

\$129,000 HIGHWAY GARAGE FOR CENTRE; PWA PROJECT

Total cost of the new highway garage to be erected by the State Department of Highways through aid of the Public Works Administration will be \$129,000, it was announced by G. Douglas Andrews, State PWA director. A total of \$945,999 has been allocated to the State by the PWA for 14 garages in the State the total cost of which will be \$2,100,000.

A PWA grant of \$58,950 will be supplemented by \$70,950 from highway department funds to cover the cost of the garage to be erected at Bellefonte. Other communities in which garages will be built are Punxsutawney, Lancaster, Montoursville, Lewisport, Temple, Pittsburgh, York, Media, Scranton, Washington, Somerset, Franklin and Montrose.

Transfer Kettle CCC camp, Mifflin county, is one of the seven camps in the State to be discontinued. A large portion of the men in it will be transferred to the Lancaster Valley CCC camp, only a short distance over the mountains to the south. This transfer is made possible due to the fact that a heavy percentage of the Lancaster Valley rollees' enlistment will terminate at the time the transfer is made.

BROOKS.—At the advanced age of 83 years, 3 months and 26 days, William Seymour Brooks passed out of this life early Tuesday morning at his home in Centre Hall, where he had lived for sixteen years. He had been ill but for a week from a heart complaint. On Monday his condition became such that there was no hope for his recovery.

Funeral services will be held on Friday at 2:30 at the Reformed church of which congregation he was a member and burial made in the Zion church cemetery by the side of the remains of his wife. Rev. D. R. Keener will officiate.

Mr. Brooks was born at Pleasant Gap, July 1, 1853, his parents having been Richardson Brooks, who came to this section from New York State, and Miss Ralston, a native of Lancaster county.

There survive the deceased eight children, as well as a brother, namely: Mrs. Foster V. Jodon, Centre Hall; Joseph M. Brooks, Cleveland, O.; Mrs. A. S. Fleck, Albuquerque, N. M.; Lee B. Brooks, Spring Mills; Emmett B. Brooks, Milesburg; Guy R. Brooks, Mrs. Clarence Blazer, Centre Hall, D. D.; Mrs. Hugh Ralston, State College.

There are also forty grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren. Mr. Brooks began life as a teamster; later took up farming, and was successful in both lines. He was a good financier, having acquired two farms before retiring and at the same time made a distribution of cash to each of his children. He was highly regarded as a citizen and assumed his full share of responsibility as such.

BELL.—Mrs. Annie Bell, widow of Dr. Coke Bell, whose illness was noted last week in these columns, died early Wednesday morning at her home in Coatesville, where she lived many years. No arrangements had been made for the funeral at the time the message was received here, except that burial would be made near her late home. She was aged about 72 years.
