## A VISIONED ARTICLE FROM

THE REPORTER OF NOV. 5, '36 Franklin Delano Roosevelt was re-elected President of the United S'ates by a popular vote variously estimated, and by a handsome plurakty of Presidental Electors. Pivotal states, long declared so, swung into line for Roosevelt, with reasonably fair majorities.
