There will be bingo games on Friday evening, November 20, at the high school. Turkeys and chickens will be the prizes. Benefit Centre Hall Independent Basketball Team.

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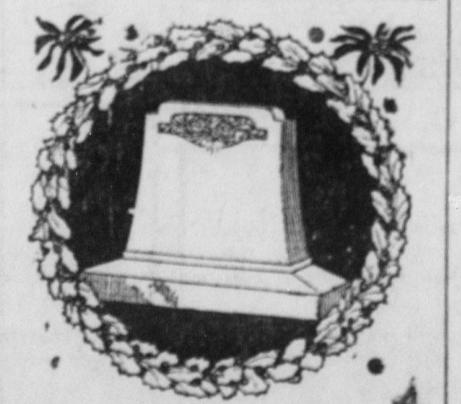
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BASH-SUNDAY.
