Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Clean up Dairy Herds—Continuous systematic testing, removal of reacting animals, disinfection of premises, and prevention of reinfection provide the only known means of acquiring and maintaining dairy herds free of Bang's disease. This disease is costly, destructive and contagious.

Replant Rhubarb—If rhubarb has grown in the same spot for more than five years, the clumps probably are crowded and the buds multiplied so that the stems are too thin and the yield reduced. November is a good time for dividing these clumps and transplanting in a new location.

Improve Pastures Now—This is a good time to begin improvement of pastures. Fall liming gives an opportunity for freezing and thawing to work the lime into the soil. Superphosphate also may be put on this fall or early next spring. Manure should be applied now or early in the winter.

Decide Pruning Needs—The effect of winter weather on fruit trees will decide how much pruning should be done. It is best to wait until severe freezing is past to see how much injury has been done. Where pruning must be started early to get the job done, apple trees should be pruned first.

Use Poultry Litter—Litter renders three important services in the poultry house. It provides bedding, to aid sanitation, absorbs moisture, and furnishes insulation for the floor. By using litter cleaner eggs can be produced and the houses can be kept warmer in cold weather.

Can Surplus Meat—Cold weather reminds that butchering time is near at hand. For successful meat curing the hot pack method is recommended by Penn State's food specialists. A jar of canned meat is a big help when unexpected company comes.

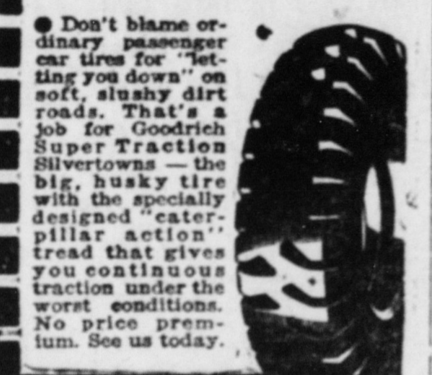

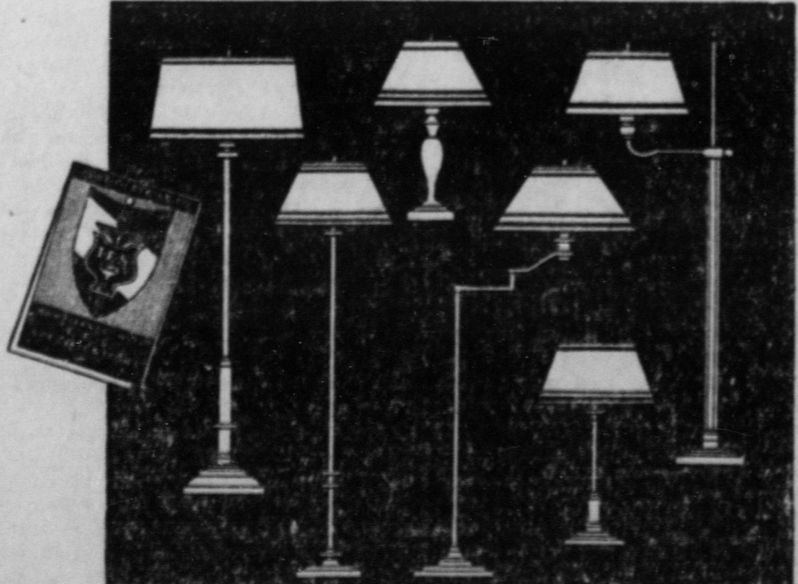
