



Progress in Road Construction-Progress continues on the road construction on Route 45, east of Spring Mills. The steam shovel has reached a point east of the Peacock farm where it shears off to the south to eliminate several curves, intersecting with the original road at the Prof. W. P. Hosterman barn. The ninetyfoot overall archway near the barn is completed, and the workmen have been transferred to the site of a smaller archway being built at Penn Hall.

On Monday road base construction began and will be pushed as rapidly as possible. The old road west of the Hosterman barn will not be disturbed this fall, but it is the intention of the contractor to have the road finished up to that point before winter sets in.
