CCC QUARTERLY ENROLLMENT TO BEGIN IN JANUARY

Notice of the forthcoming quarterly enrollment of applicants for the CCC was received recently by the Centre County Emergency Relief Board, according to a statement made by Arthur B. Lee, chairman.

The actual enrollment date has not yet been determined, Mr. Lee said, but it will be sometime between January 1 and January 15, 1937. In the meanwhile, applications for enrollment will be accepted by the relief agency. According to Mr. Lee, the enrollment will be somewhat unusual, in that the enrollees will be permitted to retain \$8.00 of their monthly wage instead of \$5.00 as has been the case up until this time.

Boys must be unemployed, single, and between the ages of 17-28, incl. Any boys in Centre county who feel they are eligible for enrollment should make application at the office of the Relief Board, on the second floor of the Watchman building, Bellefonte.

REV. W. J. WAGNER RESIGNS AS PASTOR OF LUTHERAN CHURCH AT BOALSBURG

Rev. William J. Wagner, pastor of the Boalsburg parish of the Lutheran church, recently tendered his resignation to retire from active service in the gospel ministry. He will terminate a fifteen-year term as spiritual leader of the Lutheran congregation of Boalsburg, Shiloh, and Pleasant Gap, with final services on Sunday, December 27th.

Oddly enough, the Rev. Mr. Wagner's last and longest pastorate was spent in the shadow of his boyhood home. Born nearly three quarters of a century ago into the home of Jacob and Susannah Wagner, near Tusseyville, he spent his boyhood on his father's farm. His early education was obtained in the public schools and the Spring Mills Academy. After seven years of further study he was graduated from the Gettysburg College and the Gettysburg Theological Seminary.

Licensed to preach in October, 1892, and ordained to the gospel ministry one year later by the Lutheran Church, this worthy divine has spent 43 years of his life in the service of the Christian Church. His life-time period of pastoral work has been given to the Lutheran Church in Pennsylvania. Muncy Creek parish called him as a young graduate from the Theological Seminary to serve as their pastor in May, 1894. After three and one-half years' service in this field, he continued his spiritual shepherding in the following parishes: Glasgow, Pa., 1897-1903; Buckhorn, 1903-1906; New Bloomfield, 1906-1913; Potsgrove, 1913-1920, and Boalsburg, 1921-1936. Excepting the year 1921-1922, when both Rev. and Mrs. Wagner were victims of the influenza epidemic which undermined their health for a time Mr. Wagner has been unusually faithful in the discharge of his pastoral duties, having been forced by ill health to desist from his preaching on seven separate Sundays during his life-time service in the ministry.

Married in 1893 to Katherine Hoy, daughter of Hezekiah and Mary Hoy, of near Bellefonte, Rev. and Mrs. Wagner have looked upon Centre county as their home through all these years. Possessed of qualities of grace and charm and an inherent sympathy for her fellows, Mrs. Wagner has been an inspiration and help to her husband through all their years of service in the Church. Their two children, having learned from their parents the true joy that is to be found in Christian service, are now active in the work of the Church. Mrs. John F. Harkins is the wife of Pastor Harkins, of Grace Lutheran Church, State College, and Rev. John H. Wagner is serving the large Lutheran congregation in Hudson Heights, New Jersey.

Ministerial acts performed by Rev. Wagner in his 43 years of preaching include the baptism of 529 infants, the reception into the church of 775 members by confirmation and otherwise, officiating at 218 weddings, and pronouncing the last rites of the Christian Church at 435 funerals. He has sought to bring light and lead-

ing to those who sat under him in the delivery of almost 5000 sermons.

Relieved now of the responsibilities of regular parish work Mr. and Mrs. Wagner will retire to their attractive home, erected five years ago, at 915 West Beaver Avenue, State College. However, with the spirit to serve still strong within him, Pastor Wagner announced that he will be glad to assist in the work of the Church by supplying occasionally in the conduct of regular services whenever needed. With a life filled with good works behind them, this aged couple now rest from the labor and heat of the day. May they find much of genuine satisfaction and true contentment as they enter upon the evening of life.
