GREGG TOWNSHIP VOCATIONAL SCHOOL NEWS.

Schools Closed Until January 4th—The schools of the township will be closed for the Christmas vacation until the morning of Monday, Jan. 4.

Basket Ball Teams Win from Beaver—The boys' and girls' basketball teams of Gregg Twp. Voc. opened their season in the new gymnasium by defeating the basketball teams from Beaver Vocational last Friday night. The Gregg boys won rather easily 47-16, permitting the Beaver boys to score only four points during the last half. The girls' game was fast and the score close throughout, with the Gregg team finishing on the long end of the score—39-34. A nice size crowd was out to inaugurate the new auditorium-gymnasium building. The next game will be with Snow Shoe high on the Spring Mills floor on Friday, Jan. 8. This will be the first of the League games. Admission to high school games is 25c for adults and high school pupils, and 10c for grade school pupils.

Pupils Named on Scholastic Honor Roll—The following pupils of the Vocational school earned a place on the scholastic honor roll for the second school period. All had grade point averages of 2.6 or better: Betty Lee, Isabelle Musser, Spurgeon Hennigh, John Shook, Cora McCool, and Jean Watts. The Junior class lead the classes with a grade point average of 1.66; seniors second, 1.47; sophomores third, 1.32; and freshmen, 1.04.

Sophomores Lead in Attendance—The sophomores lead the classes in attendance for the second period with a figure of 97.7% freshmen, second, 96.1%; juniors, third, 96.0%; seniors, fourth, 92.4%. The school has an attendance of 96.0% to date.

Zubler farm, west of Spring Mills, and lead direct to the Young and Corman farms. Other property owners to whose possessions an effort will be made to extend electric service are Harry Ilgen, Wm. F. Risher, Joseph Swabb, Samuel Stitzer, and others nearby these farm homes. All that is needed to make available this great convenience is closer co-operation among farm and home owners. Schools, good roads, electricity and the telephone are four of the leading institutions that enhance the value of a rural community.
