POLITICAL OUTLOOK FOR CENTRE CO. THIS YEAR

Under the above caption the Democratic Watchman has this to say:

While this is naturally regarded as an "off year" politically there is every likelihood of its proving a very interesting one in Centre county. It will be the year for the election of a Judge, District Attorney and two Jury Commissioners.

While it is yet a little early for candidates to announce, inasmuch as the primaries will not be held until the third Tuesday in September, there are rumors of a number of candidates, not only willing but anxious to sit on the bench. Of course, it is a foregone conclusion that Judge M. Ward Fleming will be a candidate for a second term, and if rumors are correct he will have as opponents, Arthur C. Dale and John G. Love. Edw. No other Republican aspirants seem to be championing in the offing at this time.

About the only available timber in the Democratic party whose names have been linked in the list as possible candidates are W. Harrison Walker and Ivan Walker, but neither one has yet made an open declaration of intentions.

As it looks now an effort will be made at the present session of the Legislature to take the judiciary out of politics, and if that is done it will likely take much of interest out of the campaign.

For District Attorney, Phil H. Johnston will in all probability be a candidate for a second term, while Muses W. Gettig and R. Paul Campbell are both spoken of as probable candidates.

The second inaugural address by President Roosevelt began at 12:25 Wednesday and was heard very distinctly over the radio. His term expired at noon consequently the time between 12:00 noon and the taking of the oath for his second term, left the great U. S. A. without a chief magistrate. Vice-President Garner took the oath of office also for the second time, immediately prior to that of the President.
