\$2,000 Job to Be Filled Brings Ample Applicants .-- The \$2000 job as rural mail carrier out of the Spring Mills post office, although under Civil Service, will bring forth an array of applicants. The job is permanent as litical jobs are these days.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission will hold an examination at Centre nigh. Hall, the date of receipt for application closing February 19th.

The qualifications of applicants include: Age, over 18 and under 50 years. A body not distorted, and free Union Methodist-Reformed S. S., of a long list of diseases.

The applicant must show (a) that he is a citizen of the United States; (b) that he has a domicile within the territory supplied by the office for which the examination is held or to be supplied by a new route ordered established from such office, and (c) that he has actually resided within the delivery of such office for six months next preceding the closing date of receipt of applications.

Pho'ographs, less than two years old, must be submitted. Examination will include the subjects of spelling weight 10 points; penmanship, 201 points; copying correctly, 20 points; letter writing, 20 points; arithmetic (simple tes's in addition, subtraction multiplication, division of whole numbers, common and decimal fractions the ordinary weights and measures U. S. money, and simple percentage) 30 points. Two hours will be allowed for the examination.

Military and naval services of applicants will give them an advantage in rating.

Three eligibles will be certified. To become eligible applicants must make a score of seven'y or more points Political and religious affiliations will not be considered.

No time is set for appointment While the Civil Service Commission gives applicants their rating, the Second Assistant Postmaster General, in charge of the rural mail service, is the power who appoin's.
