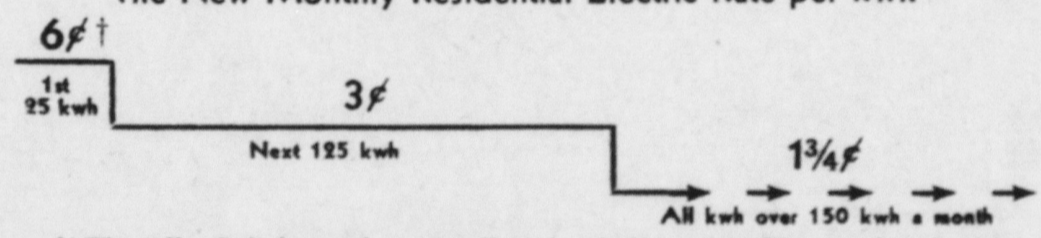

THE residential rate effective March 15 gives a reduction to most of our customers, and a decided reduction to a good majority of them. In fact, 40% of all families will now be able to use one and one-half times as much electricity with no increase in their monthly bills.

The New Monthly Residential Electric Rate per kwh*

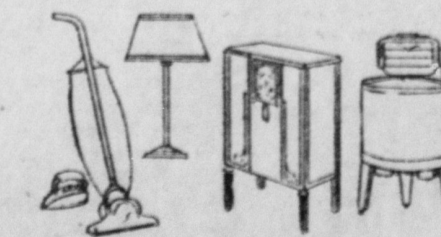


“WHAT constitutes a reasonably complete use of electricity in the home? How many of the benefits of electricity should we have in our home?”

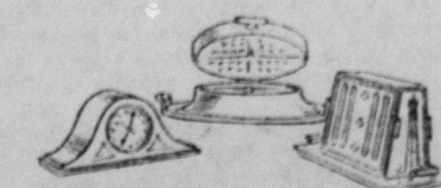
These are good questions which every family must answer for itself. In the following paragraphs a variety of uses of electricity are indicated which may help you decide in your own case. The kwh use in each instance is based on average figures.



LET us consider the cost of electricity under the new rates for young Mr. and Mrs. Joe Williams, who are setting up housekeeping, and will gradually add to their electrical equipment as circumstances and household needs change.

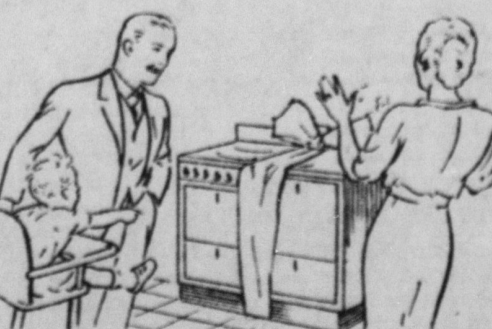


FIRST they have lights—including one good reading lamp—a washer, cleaner, radio, iron and several small appliances which they got for wedding presents. They use 53 kwh of electricity a month and it costs them \$2.34. The average cost per kwh is 4.4¢.



PRETTY soon they buy the next appliance they want—an electric refrigerator. Their consumption of current increases to 93 kwh a month, their bill increases \$1.20, making it \$3.54, and their rate per kwh drops to 3.8¢.

SOME time elapses... Joe and his wife make further plans. Having already bought a food mixer and a new table appliance or two, they decide to increase their eye comfort with a couple more sight-saving lamps—in fact to improve the lighting throughout the house. Their bill now becomes \$4.23 a month.



FOR her next birthday, Mrs. Joe gets a new electric range as a present. She is delighted. At last her dream kitchen is

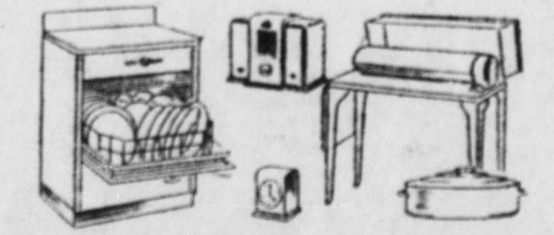
becoming a reality! All in all, she, Joe and the baby seem to be pretty much in clover, electrically speaking. The range raises the monthly cost \$2.19, or to about \$6.42. The number of kwh has increased from 116 to 241, and the average cost per kwh has dropped from 3.7¢ to 2.7¢.



PRESENTLY Joe and Martha realize how little more it will cost to have what could well be called an electric home. Perhaps there is a larger family. Perhaps there have been some good breaks for Joe. Anyway, we next find them

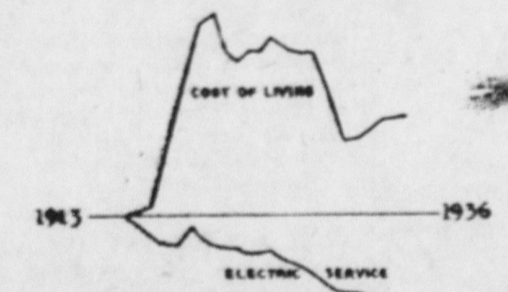
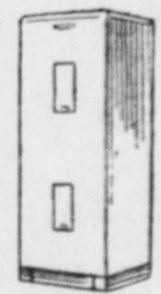


with about three times as much lighting as when they started housekeeping; they are enjoying more table appliances, a radio has been bought



for the bedroom, there is a dishwasher in the kitchen, and an electric ironer in the laundry. These additions have increased their bill \$1.35, bringing it to \$7.77.

FINALLY they install perfect hot water service. The new 66 gallon electric water heater increases their bill only \$3.20. For all the benefits of an electrified home which Joe and his family enjoy, the monthly current cost is only \$10.97. The increased use of electricity, so largely responsible for changing the Williams house into a delightful home, has lowered their average cost per kwh from the 4.4¢ they were paying, when they started housekeeping, to only 1.8¢.



THE cost of electricity has been decreasing steadily, in spite of the upward trend of other living costs. The 620 kwh which the Joe Williams family might use in their electric home would cost them \$10.97. According to the rates generally in effect 15 years ago their bill would be—believe it or not—over \$30.00!
