ELECTRIC SERVICE RATES LOWER

With living costs mounting almost daily, the average housewife gets a "break" in the reduction of electric service costs, as announced by the West Penn Power Company in our issue last week. We refer to the large advertisement appearing on page 2 of The Reporter last week, in case you missed reading it, pick up that issue and give close attention to the most interesting case of the "Williams" family, a typical American family. This family, much like the Browns, Joneses and Smiths, starts modestly by equipping the home with the absolutely necessary electrical equipment—only a few appliances—and as circumstances permit, add the more labor-saving devices from time to time until their home is a truly "electric home." Then, to their great surprise and pleasure, they find the cost of their electric service astonishingly low. The average cost per kilowatt hour is now only 1.8c as compared with 4.4c when they started housekeeping. At the new rate, the service for this "electric home" is practically only one-third the cost fifteen years ago.

In our humble opinion, electric service gives more for less than anything the householder is obliged to purchase in maintaining the modern home.

AUMAN.—One of Millheim's highly respected and typical characters passed to his reward on Sunday morning, March 7, when Daniel Auman succumbed following a short illness of erysipelas. He was 74 years, 2 months and 11 days of age at the time of his death.

Deceased was born in Penn township, Dec. 26, 1862, the son of Jacob and Harriet (Shreckengast) Auman, both deceased. He was married to Mazie Elvina Wolfe on June 21, 1890, who survives. A painter and paperhanger by trade, Mr. Auman spent his entire life in local Penns Valley. In addition to his wife, he is survived by the following children: Mrs. R. A. A brother and a sister, Mode Auman and Mrs. Michael Wance, both of Spring Mills, also survive. The funeral was held from the late home Wednesday of last week, with the Rev. A. C. Paulhamus, pastor of the Millheim Evangelical church, officiating. Burial was made in Fairview cemetery, Millheim.
