Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Kill Insects Early—Eastern tent caterpillars are more easily poisoned when young, say Penn State entomologists. Spraying with arsenate of lead at the rate of 1½ to 2 pounds of poison in 50 gallons of water is effective.

Feed Cows on Pasture—It is a good practice to continue the feeding of hay after the cows go to pasture. Grain feeding also should be maintained but in reduced amounts, according to Penn State dairy specialists. Early pasture grass does not contain enough nourishment to satisfy the cows' needs.

Mares Need Exercise—When not working, the mares should run in the pasture. As foaling time approaches, it is best to lighten the work but many mares have worked up to the day of foaling without ill effects, report Penn State horse specialists.

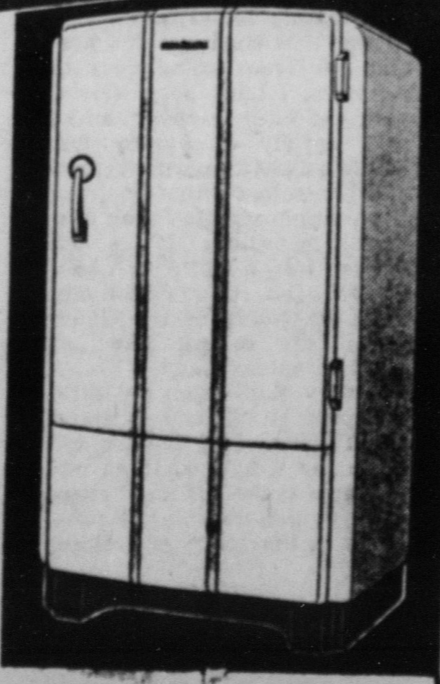
