FARM CALENDAR. Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture. Provide Community Calendar—A community calendar helps groups to avoid conflicts in meeting dates.

Mark Broody Hens—Put a black band on hens each time they become broody. "Cluckers" are out of production 10 days to two weeks each broody period.

Use Strong Plants—Early vegetable plants, which have been transplanted since before being set in the field, are best. They are short, stocky, and have well-developed root systems.

Prepare Wools Well—Wool producers who prepare their fleeces properly for market get better prices than the careless producers. Wools should be dry, clean, and tied with paper twine.

Meet Pasture Needs—Late summer pasture needs can be satisfied by planting Sudan grass. Soiling crops also help to supplement short pastures according to Penn State agronomists.

Control Cattle Disease—Area testing provides the most economical and satisfactory means of eradicating Bang's disease. There is no cost to the owner for the testing and indemnities are paid for diseased animals removed say Penn State dairymen.
