Funeral services will be held Friday at 9:30 a. m., and burial made at Millheim.

Funeral services were held from his late home at 5487 Wilkins Avenue Pittsburg, on Monday. At the time of his death he was a director of the Berkshire Life Insurance Company of Pittsfield, Mass., and senior member of Wm. M. Furey and Son, general agents for the company.
