PERMANENT CO. REGISTRARS SELECTED BY COMMISSIONERS

Under the new registration law applying to the entire state, other than cities having previously had a similar law in force, there will be three registration days in each voting district on which days voters must appear personally to be registered to become eligible to vote at all future elections. The registration days are June 18,

July 16, and August 6th. A registrar representing the two major parties will perform the service. They will act only on the three days named and will have nothing to do with the regular election.

The appointments of registrars is equally divided between the Democratic and Republican parties and is made from persons recommended by the county chairman in each party. In most if not all cases the elected regis'ration assessor will represent his party as the registrar from the dis-
