FARM CALENDAR. Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Control Bean Beetles—Safest and most effective control material is rotenone, used either as a dust or spray, say Penn State entomologists.

Cover Cropping Reduces Washing—Cover cropping may be practiced on a small scale to reduce washing in the depressions in tilled fields where the water collects and forms gullies, according to Penn State agronomists.

Hot Weather Causes Small Eggs—Farm flock owners have noticed that smaller eggs are produced by the laying flock during the hot weather, report Penn State poultrymen. This decrease in egg size may amount to 15 to 20 per cent and will effect the market value of the product.

Water Turf Thoroughly—Frequent light sprinklings keep the surface soil moist but usually do not penetrate deeply enough so that surface and subsoil meet, say agronomists at Penn State. This encourages roots of the grasses to grow in a shallow zone near the surface.

Strawberry Growers Carry Planting Over—In considering carrying planting over for another crop next year it is well to remember that the first crop taken from a planting is usually better than any succeeding crop, from the standpoint of both total yield and size of berry, say pomologists at Penn State.
