Grist Mill Leased; Will Be Improved

The brick grist mill, the property of the Spring Mill Milling Co., has been leased to Mr. Heister, of Laurelton. The lessee is a practical miller and operates a mill at Laurelton and one at Centerville, Snyder county. He anticipates replacing the inefficient over-shot water-wheel with a new and modern one and equip the mill for the manufacture of high grade flour, and all kinds of feeds. The improvement of the plant will begin at once. This mill was purchased by L. H. Dennis of Washington, D. C., now connected with the Vocational schools in a National way, and H. C.
