PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH, FOR APPROVAL OR REJECTION AT THE MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 2, 1937, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

No. 1A. A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to section one, article eighteen of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That section one, article eighteen of the Constitution of Pennsylvania is hereby amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or House of Representatives; and, if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall cause the same to be published three times before the next general or municipal election in at least two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers shall be published, and, if in general election, the same shall be published in the manner aforesaid; and such proposed amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State in such manner, and at such time at least three months after being so agreed to by the two Houses, as the General Assembly shall prescribe, and, if such amendment or amendments shall be approved by a majority of those voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution. When two or more amendments shall be submitted they shall be voted upon separately.

No. 2A. A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to section one, article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That section one of article nine is hereby amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. All property taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects within the territorial limits of the authority levying the tax, and shall be levied and collected under general laws; the General Assembly may, by general laws, exempt from taxation a uniform value in money of the total taxable value of each person's property or of the taxable value of homesteads, and also all public property used for public purposes, actual places of religious worship, places of burial not used or held for private or corporate profit, institutions of purely public charity, and real and personal property owned, occupied, and used by any branch, post or camp of honorably discharged soldiers and marines. Uniformity shall not be required in the case of income inheritance, estate and other excise taxes which may be graded or graduated and provide for exemption; but all such taxes shall be levied and collected under general laws.

No. 3A. A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to section eighteen article three of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That section eighteen of article three of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is hereby amended to read as follows:—

Section 18. No appropriations shall be made for charitable, educational or benevolent purposes to any person or community not to any denominational or sectarian institution, corporation or association; Provided, That appropriations may be made for pensions or gratuities for military services, and to blind persons twenty-one years of age and upwards, and for assistance to mothers having dependent children and aged persons without adequate means of support.

No. 4A. A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to article fourteen of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by adding section eight.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

eral Assembly may otherwise provide the tax-levying body of the city shall control all expenditures from the city treasury. Laws shall be enacted to provide that all appointments and promotions of officers and employees, paid out of the city treasury, shall be according to merit and fitness. No officer or employee, whose compensation of the whole or in part from the city treasury, shall receive for his own use any fees or commissions for any work done in the course of his employment by any public agency, and all such fees or commissions received shall be paid into the city treasury for the use of the city. No law regulating the affairs of cities or counties shall be held invalid as local or special because of the inclusion of provisions giving effect to this section.

Section 2. That no inconvenience may arise from the changes in the Constitution of the Commonwealth and in effect to carry the same into complete operation, it is hereby declared that—

This amendment shall be effective immediately upon its adoption. The amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth and the amendments to the City of Philadelphia, and until the General Assembly shall otherwise provide, shall continue to perform their duties and be elected, appointed, and commissioned or organized in such manner as may be provided by the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth in effect at the time the amendment becomes effective, but elected county officers, in office when this amendment becomes effective, shall be permitted to complete the terms for which they were elected, in accordance with a true copy of Joint Resolution No. 4A. DAVID L. LAWRENCE, Secretary of the Commonwealth.

No. 5A. A JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an amendment to article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by adding thereto a section.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That article nine be amended by adding thereto the following section:—

Section 11. In addition to the purposes stated in article nine, section four of this Constitution, the State may be authorized to issue bonds to the amount of forty-two millions of dollars (\$42,000,000) for the acquisition of land and buildings, and the construction and improvement of State owned buildings and the equipment thereof, for the care and maintenance of penal institutions, deaf, dumb, mental defective, epileptics, persons mentally diseased, the sick and the injured, and tuberculosis patients and the acquisition of land and buildings of buildings at the Pennsylvania State College.
