Death of Spring Mills Child—Robert Bruce Strickler, of Spring Mills, R. D., one year, 5 months and 21 days old, died Tuesday at the Centre County hospital from complications following a week's illness.

The child, whose mother died at his birth, is the son of Fred C. Strickler of Milton, and is survived by one brother, Fred C. Jr. also of Milton. Funeral services were held Friday at 2 p. m. from Spring Mills with the Rev. S. W. Halsey officiating. Burial was made in Hartleton, Union county.

Gregg Twp. Schools Open Sept. 7—All Gregg township schools will open on Tuesday, Sept. 7. This opening date corresponds with that of the past few years. The high school and Spring Mills grades will operate on the same daily time schedule as was introduced last year.

The morning session will begin at 8:44 and close at 12:10 p. m. The afternoon session will start at 1:30 p. m. and close at 4:00 p. m. The daily schedule for the one teacher rural schools will be the same as in the past.

Pupils entering the first grade or coming into the school system for the first time must present vaccination certificates at the time of entrance. No beginner will be admitted who will not be six years old by February 1, 1938. All pupils are urged to enter the first day.

It is estimated that the freshman class in the high school will be the largest class that has entered for a number of years. 32 pupils passed the entrance examination last spring, and it is thought that most of those who passed the test will enter Sept. 7.
