FARM CALENDAR. Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Spray Berry Plants—Anthracnose is causing serious damage to raspberry and blackberry plants. After the old canes are removed the young canes should be sprayed with lime sulphur at 1.000 sp. gr. Penn State plant pathologists explain that this is about 1 1/2 gallons of concentrated lime sulphur to 100 gallons of water.

Finish Market Lambs—Lambs going to market in the late summer or early fall usually require some grain to produce the desired finish. Penn State livestock specialists recommend as satisfactory eight parts of corn, two parts of oats, and one part of linseed cake.

Plan Tournaments—In more than 40 counties of the state rural organizations are preparing for county-wide amateur dramatic and music tournaments. The Agricultural Extension service of the Pennsylvania State College sponsors the tournaments, provides lists of plays and rules for the contests, and lends copies of plays to the groups.

Prevent Potato Injury—Bruising of potatoes may be materially reduced through proper adjustment and intelligent operation of the potato digger. In addition, some growers are padding all bars and rods on which potatoes fall, report Penn State agricultural engineers.

Use Wire Floors—Young calves are delicate and many of the troubles encountered in raising them are due directly or indirectly to unsanitary conditions. Cold damp beds, often cause colds, pneumonia, and scours, declare Penn State dairymen. Wire floors with their dry, comfortable beds prevent much of this trouble.

Market Gets Eggs—Pennsylvania supplied only 5.3 per cent of the eggs sold in New York City last year. Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York combined supplied 22.3 per cent. From these three states came 12 1/2 per cent of the dressed poultry receipts in New York City last year.
